FISH SEASON IS NEAR END

1924 Year of Sport for Anglers and Future Outlook Gives Promise of Many More to Follow.

Did you ever go to a Wine, Fish and Pleasure banquet and wonder where all the fish come from year after year? Did you ever notice the large number of Union county fishermen who, during the season go out Sunday after Sunday and bring home the limit and ask yourself how they did it in spite of the fact that more men fish the streams every year?

Thoughtful sportsmen are meditating to a greater extent every season upon the ways and means of keeping fish in the streams so the he who angler may not be merely feeding fish.

The 1924 fishing season, closing tomorrow, has been a very satisfactory one from most standpoints. Many large fish and many limit catches were caught but still the fishing is far from what it used to be.

Approximately two million yearling trout were placed in the streams of Union and Walla counties last season. Why then you may ask, cannot we increase the number of fish stocked in the streams. Principally because more fish cannot live in them. The fish must feed to survive and in cases where too many fish have been stocked, particularly in lakes, the fish have literally starved to death.

Weather is Factor.
Beaver creek and Five Points were closed to fishing last season and Ladd Creek was closed after July 15 last year and this. Closing Ladd creek during the last part of the season last year apparently did not help it any for this. Whether Beaver creek and Five Points will be much improved next year is doubtful because the dry weather forced the fish to seek the larger rivers.

The fish problem is usually reaching larger proportions. Last season \$75,000 worth of fish were sold. This season the total will be well over \$100,000 according to the estimates by the game warden.

Sportsmen Needed.
More fishermen and less fish. The only apparent remedy lies in the fishermen themselves. It would seem that fishermen should be more particular about giving the smaller fish a chance. Many sportsmen worthy of the name are using good recommending business books which are said to give the under the limit fish a chance for life when thrown back into the water.

Then again many sportsmen with smaller catches rather than the limit and perhaps an extra one or two.

Boy Babies Predominant.
With Mothers of Fifty Years.

Dresden, Germany. (AP)—That the age of the mother has an important relation to the sex of the child is asserted by Doctor Pelscher of this city, who has made this topic the subject of special studies. He found that mothers up to 25 years gave birth to just as many boys as girls. With the mothers between 25 and 35 years the ratio of boys to girls was 111 to 100, while mothers of 35 or more years gave birth to 124 boys and 100 girls.

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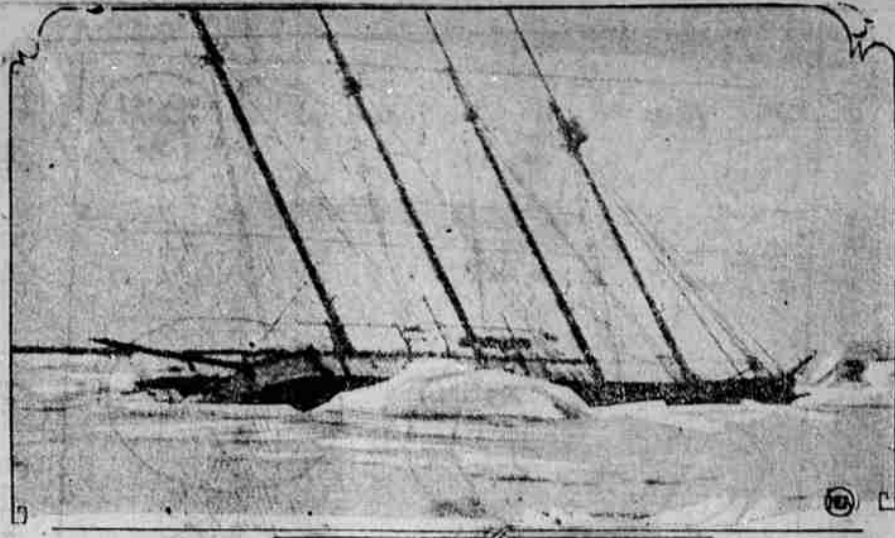
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Going Down in Arctic Waters

TURKISH PRIDE BRINGS TROUBLE TO TRAVELERS

BUCHAREST, Rumania. (AP)—Turkish nationalists have gone to extreme measures, according to information current in this city, in their endeavors to bar all foreign languages out of the country. In preparing new passports for the Angora government Turkish officials insist that not a word of any foreign language be used, and print all the documents in Turkish script.

When the bearers of these passports tried to leave Turkish territory their troubles began. No official could read the Turkish script; they could not tell whether the passport was a legitimate passport or a bill for groceries, and the bearers were refused permission to cross the border.

Horse That Could Not Be Sold Causes Upset on German Track

Berlin. (AP)—Thousands of spectators were absolutely stunned and numerous bookmakers sent to a state of confusion, to quote the Berlin sport writers, when Pan Robert, "dark horse" from Austria, at the national Genuwald track won by a length from a field of 12, most of which were "favorites," at 2,243 gold marks to 10. Hermann Heiler, the owner, for months has had Pan Robert up for sale at 3,000 marks, but there were no takers.

The race was the whitest of the fall season and all the prize winners of running races for months had been entered. There was no big bet on Pan Robert, the owner himself being dubious of his horse's performance. The bet all told amounted to but 210 gold marks and was divided among the "small fry" in five and ten mark bets. It was the first race that Alfred Heiler, who rode Pan Robert, had won this season.

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Packing of Apples New Way is Aid

Strathgyle, England. (AP)—Fresh water pearl fishers may be seen daily at work in the waters of the river Balvaig, seeking the mussel shells that occasionally conceal pearls.

They use a thin net, with the bottom removed and a glass substituted for lighting the shells in the river bed, and a long V-shaped stick at one end for bringing the shells to the surface. Occasionally a gem of value is obtained; one such recently was sold to a jeweler for \$100.

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Very rigid standards of inspection are maintained throughout the preparation of the fruit. This year for the first season the growers in Union county have obtained the services of a government fruit inspector who tests every car by opening a certain percentage of the number of boxes in the car. The boxes are opened from the side, thus making it impossible for the packers to place nice apples on the bottom and top and poorer ones in the middle of the box. Apples for foreign export are very carefully selected and individually wrapped in paper wrappings.
