HEACOCK WILL OPEN FACTORY

Radio Sets to Be Sent to Whole Country from La Grande Headquarters in Future.

Back in the halcyon days of 1914 and even earlier when a crystal detector, a single 250 ohm head phone and a tuning coil were fondly called by their owner a "wireless set" the Heacock wireless tower proudly held aloft its aerial above the two by four poles like a giant of the forest rising from a thicket.

An immense white structure 140 feet from the ground it was "HIT" wireless set of the town. It has been rumored that Mr. Heacock had actually received Alaska but some of the skeptical wireless fans would not believe such tales of then almost unheard of distances. In those days all signals were sent by the dot and dash system similar to the familiar Marconi code of the Western Union.

A few months later, when the United States entered the war all amateurs were compelled to discontinue their stations. But Mr. Heacock kept on experimenting and when after the war the radio

came out he was ready for it. Heacock manufactured sets in many La Grande homes at present and thus the announcement made yesterday by Mr. Heacock that the manufacturing plant in which the sets are built is to be moved to La Grande becomes doubly interesting. The ground floor of the Barland hotel building across the alley from the Elks club has been leased and will henceforth become the scene of action for the Heacock Wireless Manufacturing company. The plant will begin actual operation in a comparatively short time.

OLD OREGON TRAIL WINS APPROVAL OF EASTERN VISITORS

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (Special)—The Old Oregon Trail has two ardent supporters in Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Perry of Bethesda, Md., according to information received by Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Elliott of Milton whose guests Mr. and Mrs. Perry were last year.

France's Debt Will Be Studied by Commission

ports, however, and Mr. Mellon withheld information as to the business to be taken up at the session further than to say that the commission will discuss the situation as it now stands.

M. Jusserand will leave for Paris January 6, to retire from the diplomatic service of his government. His talks with Mr. Mellon, therefore, take on the aspect of an effort by him to obtain an expression regarding the terms for refunding the debt which the American government can accept. The American commission always must have in mind, however, that its settlements are subject to congressional approval. It was explained, and the views given the French representative there, how ever, have been of a character designed for information rather than statements defining the

terms which may be incorporated in a settlement. The commission has not met in more than six months, but little business awaits the members, since such settlements as have been negotiated have been submitted to them individually where ever they have been for their approval before the chairman considers any agreement. While treasury officials said the commission may take up other questions at its meeting it was not disclosed what subjects besides the French debt were awaiting its study.

Government Circles Pleased

With fiscal policies received the information that steps were being taken by France looking to a refunding settlement with undisputed satisfaction. To them it meant another move in the direction of cutting more off of the great public debt, much of which was built up through borrowings from the American people with which to advance funds to the allied powers. It was explained, that should a settlement be reached with France, the payments would apply to reducing this country's debt and a proportionate amount of the accruing interest, amounting this year to \$240,000,000. With the refunding agreement with Great Britain already in operation, any disposition of the French debt will add to the treasury considerably in working out the future financing plan. There was no definite word here Friday as to whether Edward S. Hurley of Chicago, a member of the commission, would press his plan for funding the French debt. The program was drawn up by Mr. Hurley after many conferences with French officials last summer and presented to Secretary Mellon on Mr. Hurley's return from abroad in June. Nothing has come of it thus far and other members of the commission, including Secretary Mellon, have declined to discuss it. The treasury Friday night had not been advised whether Mr. Hurley would be present at Monday's meeting.

The Hurley plan provided for an annual lump payment of France to be applied on interest and principal and would permit the use of half of the annual payment in the purchase of French industrial securities. Funds thus reinvested in France, Mr. Hurley planned, would aid in reconstructing devastated areas

and eventually would be returned with interest to the American treasury. Some officials are convinced that the Hurley plan would encounter trouble in congress while others appeared willing to give the matter thorough consideration in view of its apparently favorable reception in France.
