NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—An all-star team, selected from players receiving the highest votes in the National League's "Most Valuable Player" contest, shows that the Giants, Robins and Reds each have three representatives, Pittsburgh and Chicago two each, and St. Louis one.

The rival votes to a team of a regular player and pitcher have never crossed before. Ceade Oil in Rumania Vainly Seeks a Market

BUCHAREST (AP)—The increasing keenness of competition in the Balkans from the United States and Russia is having a disastrous effect on the Rumanian petroleum industry. The price of crude oil has now declined from 141 35.00 a carload of 10 metric tons, recorded in the spring of this year, to 141 14.00. In other words crude oil in Rumania today is worth less than \$1.25 a barrel, which is below the cost of production.

Many of the purely Rumanian oil companies have been compelled to discontinue their field operations, and most of the foreign companies have considerably curtailed their drilling programs. Crude production has now reached the highest level in Rumania's history, averaging close to 1,250,000 barrels a month.

The export tax levied on a barrel of gasoline is about 50 cents.

Old Robber Cache Found

VANCOUVER, Wash. — What a Sheriff Thompson believes to have been the cache of loot from some jewelry store robbed years ago, was found today by H. M. Black, storekeeper at Vancouver Junction, two miles north of Vancouver. Mr. Black had burned some brush from around an old stump and in poking among the ashes found 15 gold-filled watch cases, a quantity of gold pins and other small articles of jewelry. With a few exceptions the cases were void of works and some were burned so that the maker's names could not be identified. C. E. Angus, local jeweler, said that makes of the Keystone, Crescent, Philadelphia and Crown watch case companies were among the makes. Some of the brands have been on the market for years, he said.

Local truck drivers have found that the mule does more work on less food than the horse, and therefore is much more economical.

LONDON (AP)—Pilchards, herring-like fish that have risen to the first British fisheries at the time of the Phoenicians, have come back to the Cornish coast in greater numbers than in many years, and brought with them prosperity to the fishing villages. They are
