How can she save her child without disclosing her secret? That is the mother's problem. She solves it in an entirely original and gripping way.

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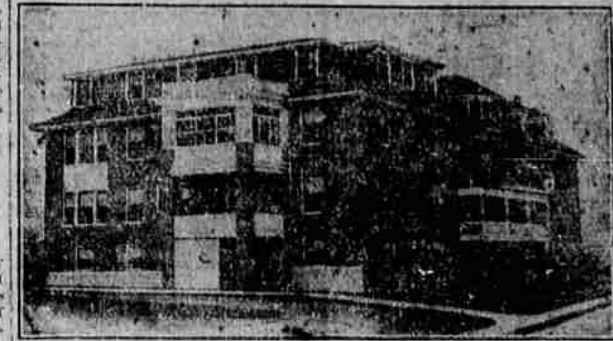
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BIG LIQUOR CARGO TAKEN
