VANCE GIVEN FIRST PLACE

NEW YORK (AP).—Arthur (Gus) Vance, Brooklyn's famous pitcher and the past season's most sensational moundman, has officially been voted the most valuable player in the National League for 1921. As a result Vance, who led all rivals in number of victories and strikeouts for the year, will receive the \$7,000 cash prize, medal and diploma comprising the first award of this kind the National League has ever made. The money will be given to the pitcher next week at the annual league meeting but the other marks of recognition will be presented with suitable ceremony some time next week.

As recognized, Vance was the only club not represented in the voting. The results of the voting were announced by Frederick G. Lieb, of New York, chairman of the committee of writers representing each city in the circuit in charge of the "National League's Most Valuable Player Contest." Each member of the committee ranked ten players in the order of his opinion of their value and the votes were counted on the basis of ten for first, nine for second, and so on.

Brooklyn's Lieb, the writers comprising the committee are: Thomas (Doc) Sullivan, Brooklyn; Jack Hader, Cincinnati; Irving Cauffman, Chicago; William Brandt, Philadelphia; Sid Kener, St. Louis; and Paul Shannon, Boston. The detailed results of the

GRAND JURY REQUESTED. J. J. Baker Sheriff to Be Deputy After Jan. 1

BAKER, Ore.—Henry McKinney, who was elected sheriff at the general election last month, announced today that he would retain the present sheriff, George Herbert, as office deputy. Frank Hildebrand, who was a member of the city police force some years ago, will be deputy and Ray Shephardson will be continued in charge of the tax department. Sheriff-elect McKinney today filed two official bonds, one for \$10,000 being the official bond for the office of sheriff, and the other, \$25,000, for the tax department.

Population Has Gained

EUGENE, Ore. (Special).—The increase in Eugene's population since the chamber of commerce took the census more than a year ago is surprising. A. R. Martin, representative of the Polk Directory company, which is now compiling a new directory of the city, declared here recently. When the census was taken by the chamber more than 15,000 people were counted, including the students at the University of Oregon, and between 12,000 and 14,000, excluding the students. Mr. Martin said he estimated from the number of names already taken by his men the population at the present time is between 19,000 and 20,000 greater than it was then.

Creamery Opens Office

CALDWELL, Ida.—The Dairy-men's co-operative creamery which recently opened offices here, and members in charge of the organization here are engaged in signing up the minimum number of cows set at 4,000, before actual operations are begun. W. H. Mitchell of Parma, president of the co-operative creamery, was in Caldwell last week and took over the work of preparing the dairy concern. H. H. Pain, one of the directors of the association, also was in Caldwell assisting in the work of organizing the territory.
