Has prohibition changed things any? Is New York in 1924, with its palaces of jazz, its bobbed haired girls an improvement on the New York in pre-Prohibition days when the Bowery flourished and there was a cafe on every corner?

"The City That Never Sleeps," the new James Crane-Paramount picture, which opened today at the Star Theatre, reproduces New York as it was in 1916 with amazing fidelity and in sharp contrast shows you New York as it is today. You pay your money and you take your choice: Against this kaleidoscope background the story stands out in bold relief.
