Curving Corners

Among many sane and familiar recommendations that experts will make to a national conference on street and highway safety in Washington is for a larger radius at street intersections.

There is not a motorist or traffic policeman who does not realize the inconvenience and danger of the right angle curb of the average street intersection. It is more than either a danger or an inconvenience. It is actually an obstacle to traffic, for it slows down unnecessarily the vehicle in making the turn.

In the days when traffic was slower and the principal vehicle was horse-drawn, the sharp turn at a street intersection was permissible. Today with traffic properly moving faster if only to accommodate its volume, the right-angled turn is an impediment.

Here and there in this city, this fact has been recognized and the radius enlarged. The practice will continue. The experts are convinced after study that in cities, this is one of many things required to facilitate the efficient handling of traffic.
