SMALL TOWNS' RELIGION DOWN

Conditions in Country Churches Painted in Dark Colors at Atlanta Meeting.

ATLANTA, Ga. (Special) — Atlanta conditions to great numbers of rural churches in dark colors. The Western H. Wilson of the National Mission of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., at a session at the Southern Methodist University, made a strong plea for strengthening religious life in the country and small towns.

"The typical country church, in many cases, expresses pessimism and gloom," he declared. He described them as being of "low spirituality" and "languid in expressing the spiritual aspirations of the people." They pull back when the people want to go forward toward fellowship, unity, and acts of mercy. "This is not true of them all. I know country churches that are filled with the spirit of Jesus Christ." Other churches he described as having "everything but religion."

"After fifteen years of work for the country church, I am profoundly depressed by the religious weakness, futility, and spiritual emptiness of many of the churches maintained by us. They have everything in them but religion. They are tremendously concerned over law enforcement; they ring with praise or blame of the educator, they have much to say about science, and the time they are concerned with finance."

"Now religion is dependent for its expression upon none of these things, and these churches are unable to express the religious aspiration of the people. The expressions they make are all of public interest, but after a while the worshiper grows away from them, and in due time the minister seeks an outlet from the ministry into education, or politics, or business showing that the churches of this sort have no spirituality; they are not seeking first after God."

Reformation Needed.
"If the Federal Council in its investigations in the future can move the churches toward mercy for the poor, pity for the unfortunate, sympathy for men of all sorts, tolerance for those of another religion, and justice clothed in love for people of another race, and in due time the minister seeks an outlet from the ministry into education, or politics, or business showing that the churches of this sort have no spirituality; they are not seeking first after God."
