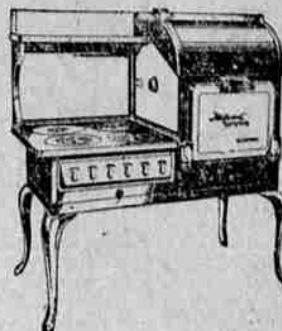

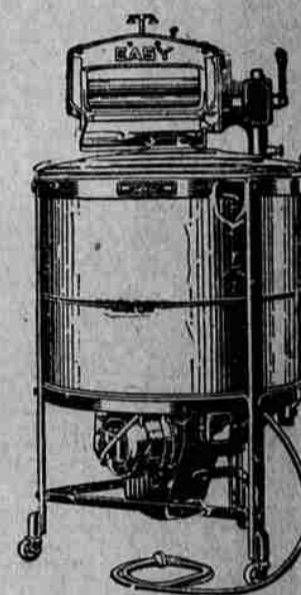

**Palmas Island Prospers**  
Despite Disputed Title  
MANILA, (AP)—The Netherlands and the United States are still disputing the possession of Palmas Island, the most southerly island of the Philippines archipelago, about 150 miles south of Mindanao. The Netherlands, however, are in control of the tiny speck of land, which was ceded to the United States by Spain under the treaty of Paris.

The affairs of the island are administered by the government of Java, and excellent progress has been made in the establishment of schools and the building of roads.

**FILLING STATION HELD UP**  
FOOD RIVER, Ore.—Two masked young men held up County Judge Hasbrouck at a service station owned by him. Just east of town. Judge Hasbrouck was engaged at the rear of the station, his back to the door, when a man spoke. He turned to find a tall man leveling a revolver at him. While one robber guarded the

station owner, a companion rifled the till of a small amount of silver and currency. After obtaining the money, the men disappeared in the darkness. Night Officer Conover was notified but no clues to identify of the men could be obtained.

**BODY OF VETERAN FOUND**  
ROSEBURG, Ore.—The body of Anthony Little, an aged civil war veteran, was found in a prospect seven miles from Glendale. The old soldier was on a furlough from the soldiers' home where he had been a resident since 1915. He had been in the habit of taking frequent furloughs and going out on prospecting trips, as he was an experienced miner. He apparently was prospecting in the region of the cabin, when he became ill and returned to the building where his death occurred, evidently about two days ago. The body was found by a party of hunters.
