### SAXON, PILLING BAN JOHNSON TO MEET HERE GIVEN REBUKE

Frank Pilling, of Cleban, Wash., and Arthur Saxon, former circus strong man and who is now following the wrestling game, will be the contestants in a mat match to be held here as the headliner of a billed card at the Star Theater Tuesday evening, December 16, according to announcements by the boxing commission's matchmaker, Ed Ford.

Boxing is in La Grande and Pilling, at the present time in Pendleton where he had a match scheduled with Ray McCarroll, will arrive here in the next few days. Both men have wrestled most of the topnotchers. Saxon has met the greater share of Pacific coast luminaries and was taught the wrestling game in the Zbyzysko, Lewis, Gatch school of hard knocks.

Preliminary to the wrestling match, which will go two out of three falls in the required two hour limit, Saxon and Recker, 120 pounders, and Ford and Clark, 90 pounders, will box.

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### Resigns

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The American league Wednesday lined up beside the National league in support of the administration of Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis and took steps toward effecting a reconciliation in the feud between its president, Ban Johnson and the commissioner.

Taking action interpreted by baseball men as the sternest rebuke ever delivered to Johnson, who wielded czar-like authority in baseball until the regime of Landis, the American league club owners unanimously adopted resolutions declaring their "continued faith and confidence in the integrity and ability" of the commissioner and pledging "fellow and unqualified support and endorsement" to him in his "methods of conduct and leadership."

At the same time, however, the American league men also followed the example of the senior circuit's magnates in refraining from personal references to Johnson's attacks upon Landis. It also was pointed out that Wednesday's resolutions while amounting virtually to a vote of confidence in Landis, failed to endorse specifically as the National league had done, the decisions of the commissioner in handling the Dolan-O'Connell bribery scandal and ordering the world series played in spite of its disclosure. On both of these points Johnson had seriously arraigned Landis.

Baseball interpreted a second setback for Johnson when his club owners, in the only other important issue before him, tabled his charges that gambling existed in connection with the Pacific Coast league.

After the meeting Johnson refused to comment on any of its developments, but it was said on his behalf that he would pursue personally his dealings with the gambling accusations.

### Homesteaders take Up

WASHINGTON, Calif.—Legislation providing for the setting aside of public lands suitable chiefly for grazing, to be leased by the government in such areas as will insure their preservation for pasturing and forage purposes, was recommended today in the annual report of the General Land Office Commissioner.

Another recommendation called

for consolidation of the public land service organization of Alaska so as to place the duties of the surveyor general and the registers and receivers of the district land offices under charge of one officer to be known as superintendent of public lands.

The total area of public and Indian lands entered and allowed during the year was 4,664,412 acres, of which 2,812,624 were allowed under the stock-raising act of 1916. Of 3,926,923 acres patented, 4,670,281 were patented under the homestead laws. Cash receipts from sales, leases and other disposition of public lands during the year totalled \$15,813,915. Plans of surveys and resurvey covering 6,593,510 acres were approved.
