SIX KILLED IN AIR ACCIDENT

SAN DIEGO (AP)—Five officers and enlisted men attached to V. P. squadron No. 2, aircraft squadrons, battle fleet, were killed and three others probably fatally injured when the twin motored H-16 type seaplane in which they were engaged in aerial target practice nose-dived 1200 feet into the sea Wednesday morning. The accident was the worst in the history of naval aviation.

The dead: LIEUT. GIOCHINO VAINI, pilot of the ill-fated plane; survived by widow, Mrs. Minnie May Vaini, 17 North Spring street, Pensacola, Fla., body recovered. LIEUT. KILBURN H. ROBY, assistant pilot; widow resides in San Diego; body not yet recovered.

LIEUT. ARTHUR P. THURSTON, "assistant pilot; mother, Mrs. C. E. Thurston, 431 Hayward avenue, Orange, N. J., body recovered.

FRED D. CRUELL, aviation chief machinist; widow resides in San Diego; body recovered. J. WHEZIK, radio man first class; mother resides at 309 W. Eighth street, Oswego, N. Y., body not recovered.

Pautz is said to be suffering from fracture of the skull and internal injuries. Physicians hold out little hope for his recovery.

Two Have Chance. Davenport and Massingill sustained severe injuries about the head and body and are believed to be hurt internally. Surgeons said that these two men have about an even chance for life.

Although aviation officials at North Island believe that the exact cause of the tragedy probably will never be known, a fairly accurate idea of what happened was obtained from Lieut. Joseph H. Gowan, a pilot of the seaplane, towing the target for the ship in which the five men lost their lives and from order servers at Rockwell field.

The H-16 plane was flying at a speed of about 85 miles an hour when Lieutenant Vaini attempted a right vertical turn. The ship at that instant was about 1200 feet above the ocean and about a half mile southwest of Point Loma.

Either the controls jammed, or one or more of the wires running to the rudder and ailerons snapped. The plane, weighting more than a ton went into a spin, plunging with terrific speed toward the sea, finally crashing in the surf about 500 yards directly west of the officers' quarters at Rockwell field.

Spindlers from the wrecked plane covered the sea for several hundred feet. It is believed that all five men in the forward cockpit were killed instantly and not

drowned, as the recovered bodies were horribly mangled.

BEND, Ore. (By the Associated Press).—A bill limiting the powers of county judges in their capacity as juvenile judges, will be introduced at the coming session of the state legislature, according to J. D. Tate, chairman of the state child welfare commission, who is in Bend for a few days.

The bill would make it impossible for a judge to permanently commit juveniles from his court without 10 days' notice to the child welfare commission, which would have a chance to investigate the circumstances.

Mr. Tate cited the example of children committed to an institution from Marion county. The delinquency charge against them was the result of the mother's serious illness and the fact that the father's time was devoted to looking after her at a hospital in a distant town.

Efforts Unavailing. The children were permanently committed to an institution and all efforts of the father to regain them have proved unavailing. Mr. Tate said he believed that the death of the mother was hastened by the action of the court, and an investigation would have revealed the exonerating circumstances.

The child welfare commission which serves without pay, has moved the state of Oregon more than it has expended, including the salary of a trained social worker, an executive secretary. Mr. Tate said last night in an interview here.

The unusual saving to the state has been through investigations which developed the fact that some institutions were receiving state aid for the care of children and in addition "donations" from the parents of the children.

The money which the family is able to pay for the support of the children is supposed to be subtracted from the \$20 which the state pays.

Mr. Tate came to Bend to secure early historical data on the Modern Woodmen of which he is national auditor. A. F. Morrison, who lives in Bend, was one of the first chiefs of the organization and Mr. Tate came to get the data from him.
