Gloria Swanson spent several strenuous days in preparation for her latest Paramount picture, "Manhandled." She worked a day in one of New York's largest department stores to get a line on how shop girls think and act. "That is, she worked almost a day before any other girls in the store recognized her," she told the blonde wig and dark glasses she wore for a disguise. When Miss Swanson was recognized there was no work done for the rest of the day as the notion counter, and the store management, in order to prevent a near riot, had to get her out the back door as quickly as possible.

In the picture, Miss Swanson plays the role of a shop girl, who climbs the false social ladder of success, getting silks and furs, only to find in the end that honest love is the best policy.

After her experience in the department store, Miss Swanson added another equally picturesque adventure to her preparation for the part. She ate several meals in a Bronx boarding house, the kind that is pictured in "Manhandled."

pare with the subway. When I went down in the big elevators at the Grand Central station I discovered just how a marine feels when he is canned-up and ready for shipment.

"Judging from what I saw and experienced I'd say that shop girls lead a hectic life, but without a fascinating one that I should judge not to be half as bad as that lived by girls on farms and in the so-called great open spaces."

Manila Treasure Hunters Will Dig for Hidden Gold

MANILA, (AP)—Two chests of Spanish gold said to have been hidden 100 years ago in a cave in the typhoon-swept hills of "Charo" (Luzon), one of the northernmost islands of the Philippine group, is challenging the spirit of several venturesome Manilaans who are preparing to go in search of the treasure. The gold, according to the natives, was secreted by an old woman who sought protection for her treasure from the frequent earthquakes and volcanic eruptions on the island.

The crew of a condignard cutter which recently visited the island brought word that two brass cannons about five feet long and a ship's bell taken from a British warship wrecked there many years ago were found. The bell is supposed to summon worshippers to a dilapidated chapel which is without a priest. There are two volcanoes on the island.

LONDON, (AP)—Application of the restrictions against fox hunting in certain portions of England because of outbreaks of foot and mouth disease among horses, has suited in a veritable scourge of foxes. Although the fox-hunting season is in full swing, the Meynell, Pychley, Belvoir, Cottingham and other hunts covering a wide area have been forced to suspend, and while farmers armed with guns have made heavy inroads on the

foxes of these districts, it is estimated that there are now more foxes in England than for many years.

Both farmers and huntmen have petitioned the ministry of agriculture for some relief from the regulations, which are considered too drastic.
