Waite high school claims the national title by virtue of its defeat of Scott high school, also of Toledo, which has held the title for several years. It was thought possible that Waite could be induced to stop in Nampa for a game either on the way to Portland or on the way home.

## CHICAGO GETS BALL SESSION

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The ball game of the 1924 drama centering around baseball's governing forces will be enacted at Chicago next Wednesday when Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis will preside over a semi-major league meeting, which is expected to produce a final "show down" in his war with Ban Johnson, president of the American league.

The decision to shift the meeting to Chicago was reached Thursday afternoon by major league club owners who reconvened on the date for their adjourned session after National league men had sought to arrange the gathering for this Saturday while a majority of American league managers held out for a postponement until late in January.

### COLLEGE LEADS WHITE SOX

CHICAGO, (AP)—Eddie Collins, second baseman of the Chicago American league club, has been appointed manager of the White Sox for the 1925 season, succeeding Johnny Evers, according to word received here Thursday night from Charles Comiskey, president of the Sox, who is in New York attending the major league meeting.

National league men, it was understood, insisted upon an early date for the meeting with Landis because of a desire to press the advantage conceded to have been gained through "rumormongers" supporters in obtaining endorsement from both leagues at their annual meetings within the past few days.

### THREE YALE MEN PLACED ON FIRST ALL-EAST TEAM

NEW YORK, (AP)—Yale, Dartmouth and Pennsylvania were given the major share of the places on the mythical all-eastern first and second teams, compiled from selections made by sports writers and coaches.

The Ells held three positions on the first team and two on the second. Dartmouth has two on the first and one on the second eleven. Pennsylvania gains one post on the first and two on the second.

Dick Luman, crack Yale end, was named by 14 of the 19 experts who participated. Four other stars were tied at 12 ballots each. They were Dooley and Diehl, Dartmouth, quarterback and guard; Pond, Yale, halfback; and McBride, Syracuse, fullback.

Wintrow Lovejoy, Yale captain, named out Ed Garbisch, Army leader, for center. Each was placed on eight first teams, but the deadlock was broken in Lovejoy's favor by his choice five times for second eleven.


