Russia Reconstructing Georgian Military Road

VLADIKAVKAZ, Caucasus (AP)—Soviet engineers have begun important reconstruction work on the great Georgian military highway which runs from Vladikavkaz to Tiflis and connects Russia with the Caucasian states. Began more than 100 years ago by czarist engineers, the road, which runs for a distance of 150 miles through the steep Caucasian mountains, is now in a bad state of repair and will require millions of dollars for its reconstruction.

An engineering achievement, the highway probably exceeds any similar project in Europe. It took 20 years to build it and it cost \$25,000,000. It has figured conspicuously in all the wars in Russia throughout the last century. Throughout its entire course, the traveler finds an unending panorama of superb mountain scenery, gorges, rivers, lakes, glaciers, ravines, waterfalls, ancient fortresses and castles.

There are several huge glacier fields close to the highway, which from time to time cause dangerous landslides, frequently resulting in the loss of life. Recently a prominent Russian engineer was caught in one of the avalanches and swept to death. His body was never recovered. Soviet contractors are now replacing many of the gigantic wooden, steel and concrete walls and barriers which protect the road from snowslides but which have become rotted from years of use.
