

EXHAUSTION ENDS MUSIC MARATHON BETWEEN BANDS

MANILA. (AP) — Rivalry between two brass bands became so keen during a concert at Pangasinan province, recently that it was deemed necessary by the authorities to call out a detachment of constabulary and the entire police force of the town to preserve order.

The reason for this display of force was that the concert was a contest of ability and endurance between the bands, one from Tinas, a nearby town, and another from Kavit, Cavite, the home of General Emilio Aguinaldo.

The supporters of the contestants were there in force, ready to defend their organization with fists if music failed. After playing more than 200 pieces during the contest which lasted from seven o'clock Friday evening until daylight the next Sunday morning, the bands agreed to call the contest a draw, thereby avoiding any disturbance.

There were no judges of the affair, it being the custom in these contests for the bands to play until one admits defeat, frequently from exhaustion. The two organizations, which are considered among the best in the Philippines, have met on at least three previous occasions, and each time the result has been a draw.

One of the rules of the contests is that all selections must be played from memory, without written music. Endurance and memory are tested to the utmost. One band plays five pieces and then the other has its turn. This program continues without intermission, day and night, until one side is beaten.

Playing from memory has been an acquisition of Filipino musicians from Spanish times. Recalling an incident at the St. Louis Exposition in 1904, where the Philippine Constabulary band played, a member of that organization said that the lights went out one night, while the band was giving a concert, and that the audience was amazed when the music continued without a break. He said the band finished the piece, and continued to play until the lights went on again.

England's Troubles In Palestine Are Appealed

League of Nations to Hear of Difficulties Encountered by British; Arabs and Jews Not in Accord; Disputed Points Include Education.

ROME (AP) — (Jewish Telegraph Agency) — Difficulties encountered by Great Britain in carrying out the Palestine mandate will be laid before the Council of the League of Nations when it meets here Dec. 15 in a report to be submitted by the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League.

The report, based on the report of Great Britain with regard to its administration of the mandate for the year 1923, will draw the particular attention of the council to disputes which have arisen between Zionists and leaders of the Arab population of Palestine with regard to immigration, the establishment of a National Jewish Home and the claims of the Arabians that the action of the administration constitutes "a seizure by foreigners of their traditional patrimony."

A considerable stream of immigration, mainly from eastern Europe is providing Palestine with a new population which is prepared "neither by technical training nor tradition to contribute to the construction of the Jewish National Home." The report will add:

"The commission is glad to express its appreciation of the efforts made by the mandatory to insure the application of the principle laid down in this article. It is bound to observe, however, that the immigration policy of the mandatory gives rise to acute controversy while it does not afford entire satisfaction to the Zionists. The Zionists feel that the establishment in Palestine of a National Jewish Home is the first duty of the mandatory, and manifest, therefore, a certain impatience at the difficulties sometimes placed in the way of immigration and granting of land to immigrants."

Arabs, Jews Disagree

"The policy is rejected by the

Arab majority, which refuses to accept the idea of a Jewish National Home.

"It is obvious that had the mandatory only to take into consideration the interest of the population, the immigration policy would be dictated not so much by racial considerations as by considerations of trade, professional attitudes and political affiliations. It is equally true that if the mandatory had not to take into account the interests of the Arab population, and if its sole duty was to encourage Jewish immigration in the exclusive interests of these immigrants and the Jews already in Palestine, it might be in a position as regards agrarian expropriation to pursue a policy which would undoubtedly facilitate to a greater extent than its present policy, the definite creation of a Jewish National Home in Palestine."

Other disputed points between Jews and Arabs, the report will say, concern questions of education, public works and the establishment of an advisory or legislative council. When the latter point is raised, according to the report, "the Arabs decline their assistance unless they are assured representation in proportion to their numerical strength, whereas the administration cannot agree to the admission of a majority resolved to oppose the establishment in Palestine of a National Home for the Jewish people, a task entrusted to it by the terms of the mandate."

Discontent Sure

The report will say that it "desires to state that though there is undoubtedly discontent in Palestine, it is in no way attributable to the administration, which is endeavoring to discharge the two-fold duty imposed on it under the mandate," and will add:

"The commission has noted with satisfaction the very definite statement made by the accredited representative on behalf of the administration repudiating the designs of certain Zionist extremists for supplanting the Arabs in Palestine by the Jews. This declaration

should, in the commission's opinion, tend to allay the anxieties which imperil the peace of the country."

The members of the Permanent Mandates Commission are: Marquis Theodor, of Italy, who acted as chairman; M. van Rees, Dutch representative; M. Boau, France; M. Hunge-Wickell, Sweden; M. Freire d'Andrade, Portugal; Sir Frederick D. Lugard, Great Britain, and M. Kunio Yanagihita, Japan. Sir Herbert Samuel, high commissioner of Palestine, participated in the meetings at which the commission framed its report.

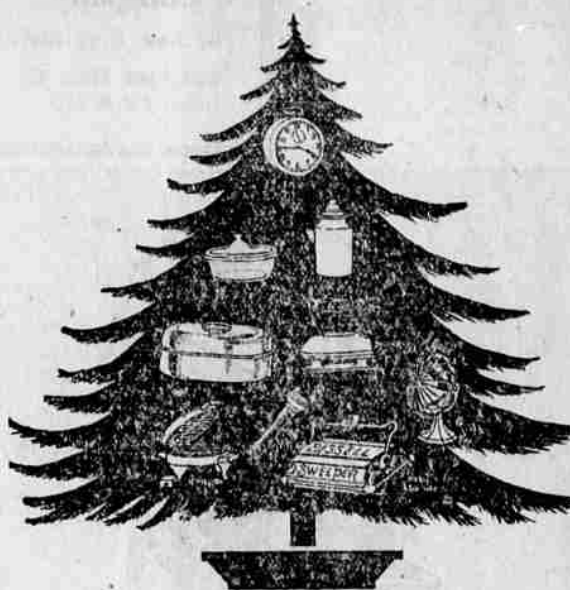
