Bebe Daniels Mobbed By Crowd in the Argentine—for Movies.

Bebe Daniels knows now what it feels like to be mobbed, and roughly handled by a mob, and she doesn't like it.

In her latest Paramount picture, "Argentine Love," made under Allan Dean's direction, Miss Daniels is set upon by an infuriated mob, led and incited by a jealous rival and father of a boy who had been killed in a quarrel over Bebe's love.

The scenes depicting the rising fury of the angry, threatening mob were rehearsed thoroughly during an entire morning, until the actor extras imagined they had an actual grievance against Miss Daniels. As the noon hour approached, and the hard-working extras began to feel the pangs of hunger, they began to warn to their jobs and handled the little star with effective violence.

She was rushed off just before the scene was shot, and repeatedly, her arms were suddenly raised very under the onslaught and she was altogether in a sorry state.

However, the action reaches its climax in a scene where she is dragged through the town square, tied to a cart and dragged, this being a form of punishment meted out, according to an old Spanish custom. There was sufficient realism put into this episode to please even the exacting Allan Dean.

An index of Miss Daniels' battle scars when the scenes were completed, included rope-burned wrists, welts on her back, and a miscellaneous collection of black and blue marks, scratches and bruises. Her costume was a total wreck.
