After a while I was passing Mrs. Sweetin's cottage and right stepped out. He said he had gone there to get a drink.

"They often left that way," she continued. "She used to leave the tabernacle just before altar services and he generally left just after the altar services."

Mrs. Emma Kirk testified that she "saw Mr. Hight come out of the door of Mrs. Sweetin's cottage right after the service."

Alva Settle declared he had heard Hight ask in the presence of Mrs. Sweetin, "Hight, who got pretty hands?"

J. L. Fitzgerald told of seeing Hight visit the Sweetin home frequently and that he just walked right in the front door.

Sees Two in Swing. Mrs. Molly Jones had seen Hight and Mrs. Sweetin in the swing on the front porch of the Sweetin home and said they were sitting "tolerably close" one evening.

Rev. A. Hanson testified that he had seen Hight take Mrs. Sweetin's hands in both of his and put it in the afternoon. It was said, and the couple were believed to be out. Funeral services probably will be held Thursday if a son from Portland arrives. It was said Tuesday night. There are three other daughters in the family. Lois, who was visiting in Boise Monday, and two who go to school in Denver.

Lon Gossman, who said he was a good friend of Sweetin, asserted he had seen Sweetin say in reference to Hight that he had "no use for that preacher," that he was always "putting into other people's business."

Gossman described an occurrence at the Sweetin home the night before Sweetin died, saying that in presence of Mrs. Sweetin Hight remarked, "well, he is about gone."

"I took Edie out of the room," Gossman added, "and told her not to pay any attention to what Hight said. When we went back into the room, and Hight repeated, 'he's about gone.'"

prior in the time McCoy met Mrs. Mors. Salke Tamm, negro maid of Mrs. Mors, declared that the antique dealer and his wife had quarreled before the introduction of the ex-fighter and that one time Mrs. Mors struck her husband in the face.

The blow was a direct one to the prosecution. Before the maid was called to the witness stand, Deputy District Attorney E. J. Dennison announced to the court that he intended to establish by the maid's testimony that "absolute fidelity reigned in the Mors household before McCoy was introduced there."

Dennison conducted his assertion with the murder indictment against McCoy by declaring that the latter "planned and premeditated" the whole affair up to the death of Mrs. Mors and the sub-

In 1884 he struck out from nothing to make his mark in the world. He landed in Chicago to read law with just \$2.50 in his pocket.

He read law, taught in night school—and lived for a considerable period on less than eight cents a day. During this period he slept

on the floor by the stove in the office where he was studying law. In 1889, having acquired a legal education and a bride, Miss Minnie Nelson, of Earlfield, Ill., the future struck out for the northwest.

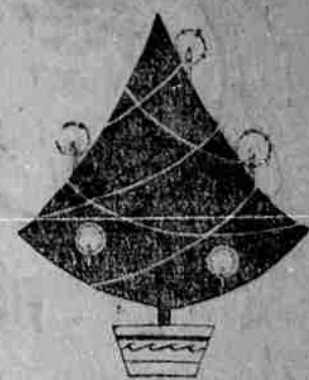
