

BERLIN STAGE PROCURES GIRLS OF PROMINENCE

BERLIN, (AP)—The daughter of a German admiral prominent in the world war, daughters of school principals, physicians, lawyers and municipal conductors, and wives of thoroughly respectable bookkeepers and office employees figure among the chorus girls of the musical comedies and revues now being staged in Berlin. They bear evidence to the fact that the day is past when the chorus girl was looked upon as a person of doubtful morals on whom adventurous cavaliers could lavish their attentions.

No marked has become the change that German women who are caught answering questions as to the home addresses of chorus girls, or who accept the advances of carrying notes or floral offerings from theater-going men to members of the chorus, are punished without further ado.

Advertisements for positions in the chorus nowadays bring out a large number of responses from the educated middle class. Economic distress compels many young women who would formerly have remained at home waiting for husbands, to engage in some calling. To some girls the idea of spending their lives behind a typewriter does not appeal. If they have a good figure and are graceful in their movements, they are women who they should not make capital out of these attributes as accomplishments.

Given a graceful figure and not any Berlin theater directors find that the girl of education usually advances much more quickly than the girl whose only qualification is good looks. Many young women who were driven to it to earn money for purely economic reasons have developed into first class stars who now would not think of giving up their profession.

N. E. A. Shows keen interest in Membership Campaign

BERLIN AIMS HARD BLOW AT CITY WIRELESS FAN

BERLIN (AP)—Aviators flying over Berlin report that the rumormongers of the city give it the day of a huge spider web. In the early morning hours the wire stretching endlessly from roof to roof, shining brightly with their coverings of frost.

Seemingly harmless and adding to the pleasure of radio fans, these wires have, however, created serious problems. The chaotic masses have protested that the wires with their business, as in this they are supported by the men who repair roofs. Nor do the landladies like aerials on their roofs.

As a result of these various objections, a city ordinance has been passed to the effect that all radio equipment over roofs within the city limits must come down, and no more may be erected.

Three American Stamps Being Held Prices at London Auction

LONDON (AP)—Sir Nicholas Wodehouse's famous collection of American stamps was auctioned in London recently and realized \$24,700. Many of the stamps will remain in England, but a large number will return to America. Elliott Perry, of New Jersey, paid \$2,475 for a ten-cent block of 1953 stamps which originally cost \$23.30 when issued.

Another rare block of eight five-cent brown stamps of the issue of 1947 realized \$2,750 and was purchased by Philip Ward of Philadelphia. Seven years ago this block was bought by Sir Nicholas for \$200. Among other high

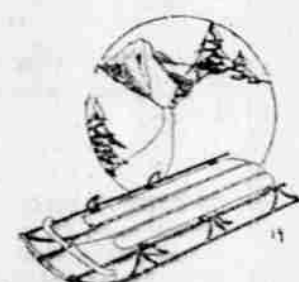

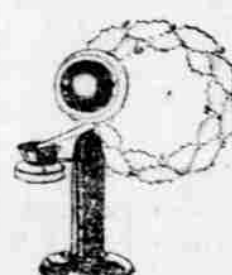
