American Swimmers to Engage in Exhibitions in German Cities.
 MAGDEBURG, (AP)—Negotiations have been completed between the Helms Swimming club of this city and a number of American swimmers of renown for a series of aquatic matches and exhibitions in German cities, including Magdeburg, Berlin, Hanover, Leipzig and Munich next year.

"Ten Commandments" Producer Conquered Vast Difficulties.

Conquering technical difficulties almost insuperable, Cecil De Mille in "The Ten Commandments" coming to the Arcade Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 22 and 23, breathed the breath of life into the ancient monarchies and caused Israel and Egypt to live. The feat was achieved for the screen while filming the Biblical introduction of "The Ten Commandments." Whilst master painting and sculptors have reproduced single scenes from the Egyptian language, the Israeliic exodus, the wilderness, and the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai, yet the great resources of the master have never been used before for this purpose.

De Mille, in this Paramount work, shows the making of the Red Sea for the passage of 2,400,000 Hebrews and the subsequent meeting of the waters to drown the Egyptians.

That climax is led up to by a series of scenes in the Land of bondage. These center around the Pharaoh and the mighty city of Ramesses, the largest structure ever built for pictures. They constitute a replica of the royal Egyptian architecture of that period. Within and without the walls, the life of the hieratic kingdom, and the oppressed Hebrew bond slaves throes accordingly. Later in the wilderness the lighting of "The Ten Commandments" is shown. Idolatry creeps in during the absence of Moses on Sinai; the spectacle of thousands of the vernal people worshipping the Golden Calf, followed by the awful punishment of Heaven's fire, remains a grand theme, required both during imagination and the device of a novel technique. Mr. De Mille directed an army of three thousand people and the labors of a large staff of artists.

The Biblical part of the story forms a powerful exordium to "The Ten Commandments" theme which thence forward is handled in a modern setting.

Suffice to say that the story is crammed to the brim with action and moves at a rapid pace from beginning to end. The settings have been carefully chosen and the many outdoor locations are infinitely pleasing to the eye. And for the benefit of the ladies, we want to say that Miss Kirkham is just as statuesquely beautiful as ever. Her clothes are veritable creations, the sort which have won for her the enviable reputation of "the screen's best dressed woman." Mr. Stewart is his usual pleasing self; we can think of no higher praise. Taking it by large, the picture is to be recommended as one which is distinctly worthwhile.

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Millions Will Witness Eclipse of January 21
 WASHINGTON, (AP)—The use of excursion trains to enable the public better to see the total eclipse of the sun, January 24, 1925, is suggested by Professor George H. Peters of the Naval Observatory. He was discussing this phenomenon which will be visible under favorable weather conditions, in the eastern part of the country.

The middle line of the shadow path during the eclipse, the professor pointed out, will run from Buffalo to Montauk, Point, N. Y., between seven and ten o'clock in the morning. In a section of the United States well supplied with railroads, the railroads might run special trains for the benefit of the public, he declared, shunting them on sidings during the period of eclipse.

Hoot Gibson Here Again In New Play.

Hoot Gibson, star in "Broadway or Bust," Universal-Gibson production to be shown at the Star Theater today was a real, hard-working cowboy before he became a motion picture actor.
