FISH OILS DEODORIZED SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Discovery that fish oils can be deodorized by passing hydrogen, nitrogen or carbon dioxide gas through them has been announced by Dr. H. K. Benson, professor of chemical engineering in the University of Washington.
