## La Grande Theatres

Famous Dancer Appears in Film At Sherrys Today.

One of the featured players in "Virtuous Liars," is ALBERTA ROACH, formerly prima ballerina of New York and Chicago opera and the Royal opera, Vienna.

Miss Roach appears in a solo dance at a reception given by a wealthy art patron in the story.

### Last Showing of "Ten Commandments" Tonight at Arcade.

Apocryphal reported discovering of a "Temple of the Golden Calf" by archaeologists working in Palestine, a vivid and colorful representation of that worship is on view at the Arcade theater (Wednesday) in Cecil B. De Mille's film spectacle of "The Ten Commandments." The calf image, there shown is the size of a man, requiring eight strong burdon-bearers to carry it. The frenzy of the worshippers grows wilder and wilder after the idol is elevated to its dais. Following the Bible story, the people strip themselves for the revel of dancing and drink which is led by Miriam, the greatest high priestess of the god. This breaking of the first commandment has its tragic sequel when Jehovah's lightning gives the image to pieces and Moses, aided by the tribe of Levi, destroys the idolatry.

The orgy of the Golden Calf has been identified by scholars with the "bull worship" common to Semitic lands. In a later age, during the system of Jeroboam, small golden images of the animal god came into use, and on account of its small size the tallman was called the calf. The rabbins say that the idol wrought by Aaron and destroyed by Moses was the representation of a yearling ox. After the conquest of Canaan the bull worship maintained itself as a secret idolatry, but it does not seem probable that the followers of Jeroboam permitted temples of the Calf.

The materials for the Golden Calf worship came from the "dis-spoiling" of the Egyptians. In a striking scene the women are shown giving up the gold jewelry with which Egypt had dowered them after the Plagues. This was melted in the furnace and shaped by goldsmiths into plates which Aaron (according to the rabbins) hammered around the wooden skeleton framework. De Mille gives the spectators a brief but graphic view of the idol-making.
