TEGUIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—American business interests in Honduras are concerned over the utter carelessness which has characterized the handling of mail matter within Honduran territory, from the United States. Serious losses and much inconvenience have resulted.

It seems that some 150 sacks of mail from America accumulated recently at Pito Soto, near Caste Yojon, in a wooden building. Marauders came that way, and as the sacks were unguarded, they looted them all. Letters, documents, checks, drafts, invoices, etcetera, were scattered about in the fields and the mail sacks themselves carried off to be used as rain coats.
