STEVENS DEFEATS LINDOW SALT LAKE (AP)—Irlick Stevens, Salt Lake heavyweight boxer, defeated Jim Lindow here Monday night. Stevens was awarded a technical knockout over Lindow in the fourth of a scheduled six-round bout.

NEGRO MAY MEET DELANEY NEW YORK (AP)—Tiger Flowers, Atlanta negro middleweight, who boxes Joe Lohman of Toledo here New Year's afternoon, may oppose Jack Delaney, Bridgeport, Conn. fighter, who conquered Paul Berginbach in a match at Madison Square Garden January 16. Negotiations for the contest were said to be nearly completed.

STUPID SET PACE, SAYS EDUCATOR

Departmental meetings, involving some 20 phases of school work, were started and will be continued today. College alumni, societies and teachers' groups held luncheons and meetings yesterday during the intermissions from the regular convention programme.

Adjournment will be tonight, after a day of departmental programmes and a general session. At the afternoon meeting Miss Mabel Carney of Columbia university, President Butler and Chaplain John W. Beard of the American Legion will be speakers.

Yesterday Miss Clara L. Jabnke, president of the Washington Education association, Spokane, emphasized the importance of the guidance of school legislation by members of the profession. Teachers are educational experts, she said, and should take the lead in formulating state programmes. She described activities of teachers' organizations in Washington.

That the little red school house no longer represented a solid American institution, and that graduates of modern city and country schools were better educated than their country cousins was the contention of Miss Carney in an address. Her subject was, "A Nation-Wide Programme for Rural Education."

Departments Have Sessions. Thirteen departments held separate meetings yesterday afternoon and discussed problems of interest to their own branches. Other departments will meet today for final sessions and election of department officers. Programmes were largely of a technical nature. Largest in attendance were the meetings of the school principals and the city superintendents, which combined to hear President Butler.

Teachers in the division of modern languages heard a demonstration of foreign language instruction by phonograph. Mrs. Edith H. Patton, University high school, Eugene, told of the use of the machine, and predicted general use as a means to improved pronunciation.

No request that German teaching be reinstated in high schools will be made by the department of higher education until the stand of the American Legion bodies in the state has been determined. It was decided yesterday. The meeting included a discussion by Dr. Raymond

H. Wheeler, professor of psychology, University of Oregon, of the practical uses to which intelligence tests could be put as a means of determining qualifications for college entrance. Carlton E. Spencer, registrar at the University of Oregon, acted as chairman on account of the absence of Calvin V. Drayton, also of the university.

MIDWEST PULLING FOR NOTRE DAME

CHICAGO (AP)—With one day remaining before the Notre Dame-Stanford inter-sectional football game at Pasadena, Calif., New Year's day, the Midwest is pulling for "Katie" Becken's famous "Four Horsemen" to ride roughshod over the Californians, thus enabling the Notre Dame eleven to finish 1924 with a record of victories from coast to coast.

Among the Midwest followers at least, the game overshadows interest in the California-Pennsylvania contest to be played at Berkeley on the same day, because of the inter-sectional reputation of Notre Dame. The most widely advertised eleven the country has ever known.

COACHES MEET TALKS RULES

LOE ANGELES (AP)—Upwards of 20 gridiron coaches of institutions of the western United States at a meeting here Tuesday, organized a Pacific coast branch of the Football Coaches' Association of America and endorsed three of four alterations in 1925 rules suggested at a meeting of the parent body in New York. The other change was altered slightly by the westerners and a resolution sent to the national association.

Glenn R. "Pop" Warner, coach of Stanford university, was elected chairman of the new organization and Elmer Henderson of the University of Southern California was chosen district representative.

Suggest Changes. The suggested changes in the rules are as follows: The restoration of kick-off to 40-yard line instead of mid-field and abolishing of the tee.

The three alterations which are to be brought before the rules committee of the Football Coaches' Association of America which met with the approval of western coaches, are as follows: Abolition of giving first down on off-side penalty unless penalty gives offensive team ball beyond point to be gained.

"Eating responsibility for watching for roughness against kicker upon head line-man instead of referee.

Abolition of giving first down on blocked kick behind line of scrimmage if recovered by kicker's side, until ball is recovered at or beyond point to be gained."
