which Dr. Murphy, the chairman briefly outlined in his report, which I understand was adopted at said meeting.

"My object at this time is to get the matter properly before the people that are interested in the work, that they may better understand the working plan as submitted to Dr. Murphy.

"I would undertake to direct the work from my office, fix up a room in the basement of the Court House for a receiving and distributing depot; any article or articles in the way of clothing of all kinds, shoes, bedding, mattresses, coats and all kinds of nursing food suitable for destitute families to be delivered at the back door of the Court House we will undertake to see that it reaches those most in need, we don't expect this to be a dumping place for junk, but any serviceable article in the way of food or clothing will be looked after.

"In addition to food and clothing we will need some funds to handle other relief problems that we can't reach through our supply depot.

Rev. Creasey responsible for Move
"Rev. Creasey I think is responsible for the statement, that a lot of our people were anxious and willing to give to this work. If they had any assurance that it would reach the spot intended, without being absorbed in overhead expense. Under the plan I have in mind we will not have any paid secretaries or clerks—every thing to go direct to the ones in need of it.

"To raise money for this purpose my plan is to establish two funds—the known and unknown; the unknown to be a sort of a conscience fund, that is any one that has overlooked some item in their income tax report, thereby not having paid quite as much in come tax as they should this being the time of year when business and professional men are balancing their books, if they find a good balance on the right side of the ledger, see how easy it would be to relieve one's mind, by donating a share of this to charity, also since \$2.00 what is in sight, some

in shops, factories, homes and schools. The First Aid car in charge of skilled surgeons was the medium for new instruction and interest along the transcontinental railway systems which it traversed. Other railroads have asked for it in such numbers that the car is booked a year in advance. Life-saving struck a new level by whole-selling its message of mercy through a joint-campaign reaching every Boy Scout troop in America. Service to ex-service men mounted in volume.

"So the romance of Red Cross service goes through the whole range of its services. Its program of amelioration has been strengthened and new beginnings made in the field of prevention to which its Congressional Charter commits it.

"In reading the service reports which follow, read back of the statistics and financial tables and see the flesh and blood of American manhood and womanhood and enthusiastic childhood holding the Red Cross line with a devotion which in many instances is epic. 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made headway toward completion. Among these are the Child Health demonstration at Mansfield, Ohio, which is financed by the American Red Cross and conducted by the American Child Health association, and the East Harlem Health Center, which has been financed nationally through the competent agency of the New York County Chapter.
