Stanford Unable to Stop "Four Horsemen" in Their Dazzling Charges—Final Score 27-10.

ROSE BOWL, Pasadena, Calif. (By the Associated Press)—A typhoon of speed swirled out of South Bend, Ind., and landed here Thursday, sweeping Stanford University's football team under a 27 to 10 score. Notre Dame had the speed.

The famous "four horsemen" were pitted against Ernie Nevers, Stanford's star, and the gallant Cardinal through he covered himself and his attack with lightning, could not stall off their repeated rushes.
