At 3 o'clock last Monday afternoon Mrs. Stella Kenney, wife of Michael S. Kenney, Casper motion picture man, received word that her husband was seriously ill here.

Her two small children were in school and despite her frantic efforts to catch a fast train leaving at 5:15 o'clock, it was 5:20 when she reached the station in a taxicab. To her surprise she discovered that the train had been held for her at the direction of officials, who had learned of her plight.

Passengers on the train crowded at first, but when they heard her story they became sympathetic.

However, Mr. Kenney died before his wife and children reached here.
