BAKEL, Ore. (Special)—Upon the return of Coach Glindeman from Idaho and the reopening of school the basketball team has been going through some very rigid training. The long vacation has only helped to increase the demand for the game, by all who are out. They have returned to practice with renewed vigor, and expect to put out a winning team that will take the eastern Oregon championship, and give them a chance to vie for championships of the whole state.

"Although the progress has been slow, the team has shown a great improvement since they first turned out for practice. This is probably due to the new system of playing which is being used, and which they are unaccustomed to, but as soon as they have learned how to use it effectively it will prove a decided asset to them. It is something new in basketball, and has probably never been used in this section of the state which will also prove of great advantage to the team." LANDSLIDE BLOCKS ROAD

PARIS (AP)—Lucien Vinet, lightweight champion of Europe, Tuesday issued an official challenge to Johnny Dundee, former featherweight champion of the world for a 26-round fight next month at the lightweight limit. Vinet proposes that the bout be staged on a winner-take-all basis and that a side bet of 25,000 francs be posted.

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FINN DEFEATS U. S. RUNNERS

Paavo Nurmi Outruns the Best American Talent in Mile and 5000 Meter Events.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York (By the Associated Press)—Less than two hours after he had beaten the pick of American talent in a mile race in which he shattered two world's records, Paavo Nurmi Tuesday night wound up his American indoor debut with another world's record victory in the 5000-meter run at the Finnish-American games. Nurmi decisively conquered his countryman, Alfie Hilda, in the finishing exhibition of his epic performance and clipped to seconds from the world's record for 5000 meters, set by Jole Ray in 1919. Nurmi's time was 14:34.35.

In his previous race, Nurmi not only broke the world's indoor mile record but was announced as shattering the 1500-meter mark on his way to triumph.

3-YEAR-OLDS MAKING READY

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—More than 150 of the fastest three-year-olds in the country probably will be nominated for the first renewal of the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs next May 15. Last winter 174 entries were named for the \$50,000 classic, and the number of high class two-year-olds developed this season indicates as many or more will be in the race before nominations close the last week in February. Of the large number originally made eligible, only rarely do more than a score start in the big race.

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California Saves From Ruin

OAKLAND, Cal. (AP)—Mission San Jose, a picturesque California landmark 20 miles south of here, is to undergo its first renovation since it was erected by the Spanish padres in 1781. The mission contains historic records and an ancient graveyard with monuments bearing the names of some of the men who opened the gates to western civilization.

After the complete restoration of Carmel Mission, in Monterey county, in which the famous ruins, Junipero Serra, is buried, San Jose Mission, in San Benito county, was rehabilitated. The San Jose Mission is next on the program.

There are 21 old Spanish missions in California, separated from one another by about 25 miles, a day's journey in the old times. The preservation committee is headed by Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover and Joseph H. Knowland, Oakland publisher.

Berlin Flocks to See Latest in German Radio
