L. L. McKinnon, of Albee, has secured 50 acres of the 2500 that are to be placed in sugar beets.

J. W. Reynolds has contracted to grow 100 acres of beets for the factory. Thirty-four such farmers would make the required amount and the contract will be ready for the signatures of the factory people.

FRENCH LITIGANTS WAIT YEARS TO GET INTO COURT

TRAVELERS TO GET VARIETY

Sahara Express, Bi-weekly Service, Goes from Paris to Timbuctoo in 12 Days.

PARIS (AP)—The Sahara Express, a bi-weekly service which will be in operation next month, will take the traveler from Paris to Timbuctoo in 12 days.

The trip from Paris to Colomb-Bechar, via rail to Merselk, boat to Algiers and rail to Colomb-Bechar, will occupy three days.

The first stage of the trek through the desert from Colomb-Bechar to Beni-Abbas, is over a distance of 200 kilometers, 50 of which will be covered in caterpillar automobiles and 150 in cars with wheels. The second day in the desert ends at Timbuctoo, 170 kilometers from Beni-Abbas, the entire distance being covered in caterpillar cars. Adrar, with its 4,000,000 date trees and fortified town looking like a medieval fortress, 250 kilometers away from Timbuctoo, is the terminus of the

third day in the desert.

Benari, on a camel caravan with wheels will be used on the third day as well as on the fourth, which provides for a jump of 450 kilometers from Adrar to Oullin, through the Tanezouft, the native name for land of thorn and fear." On the fifth day 510 kilometers will be negotiated in cars with wheels, through the same desolate country, ending at Tassalit. The sixth day will be devoted to resting at Tassalit; on the seventh day the cars will cover 230 kilometers to Tabankort, and on the eighth day after a trip of 350 kilometers the Niger will be reached at Gao.

The last stage of the journey from Gao to Timbuctoo will be 500 kilometers on the Niger in river boats.

Tourists will not have to sleep in the open; hotels are being put up at each terminal point in the desert for their accommodation. At Beni-Abbas they will be quartered in a palace on the edge of a cliff; the old castle at Adrar will be placed at their disposal and also the palace at Timbuctoo. Bathrooms with running water are being installed in these palaces of the desert sandy wastes and dance music will be provided in the evenings.

The "Sahara Express" will have one modern improvement which is unknown in transcontinental express in the United States or Orient express in Europe. A machine gun will be carried in the first and last car of the caravan, to ward off any possible attack by natives.

London Checks Drug Traffic

LONDON (AP)—The London police campaign against the illicit sale of dangerous habit-forming drugs, coupled with the existing legislative provisions against such sale, has reduced the import of these drugs in some cases by about 80 percent, according to statistics recently made public.

The decrease, it is stated, is due entirely to the steps being taken by the authorities against the manufacture of the drugs, and not to any diminution in the amounts prescribed by physicians.
