Mr. Geocox, who was born in 1859, spent more than five years in completing the painting. An effort will be made to have the legislature appropriate \$1,500 with which to purchase the work.

SILK SOX NOW ON IRISH LEGS

LONDON (AP)—The little shop girls of Ireland are responsible for a boom in the artificial silk trade that is one of the bright spots in the business life of these isles.

The manufacturers of a new process of weaving artificial silk materials, an industry started long before the war, are now banking faster dividends because the girls in the shops and offices, and even schools, are no longer content to wear the cotton stockings and cotton blouses which they displayed before and throughout the war. That attitude for style changing which in America could make and unmake fashions overseas is now slower in England, and a year or so ago the English girls found that much of their artificial stocking was based upon such stockings.

The manufacturers of the artificial silk then reopened their mills, closed by post war storminess and have kept the factories working overtime producing stockings, blouses and other similar articles. The artificial silk trade has grown until now most of the best established woolen and cotton spinning firms are producing artificial silk of some sort. Machinery for making artificial silk gorgeous and novelities being invented and marketed daily.

SECRETS SLIP IN RED PAPERS

PARIS (AP)—A most complete system of espionage is provided for in documents alleged to have been issued by the French Communist party. Conservative journals have published these papers, availing the belief that they are genuine but ultimately, the official communist organ declares them to be forgeries.

The lowest unit of organization in the party is the "cell," next above comes the "rayon." Members of "cells" are charged to supply detailed information as to the activities, output, payroll, etc., of the industrial plant or factory where they may be employed. Especially are they to observe the doings of members of the bourgeoisie class. This information is turned over to the "rayon," which collates and makes use of it.

"Cells" among the police, customs employes, postmen, dockworkers, servants, etc., are charged with the duty of spying upon the movements of the bourgeoisie outside of their business. Also they report on all stocks of arms and ammunition in their vicinity and investigate all supplies of gasoline, tell where situated, the amount, how they are guarded day and night, and report whether any Communist sympathizers are employed in these plants.

Automobile garages, pleasure cars and trucks must be enumerated and located, in short, nothing is forgotten that would "provide" the necessary material for the burning of a town and round up the vehicles that only be available to transport the insurance policies when the "great day" comes.

The French government, although expending a few dozen forgers of communistic connections, gives the impression that it regards this infiltration as relatively insignificant. Complaint is made to some official circles that the incident has resulted in American tourists, because of exaggerated stories, deciding not to come to France for the present.

Oregon Flax Sent East

SALEM, Ore.—The state poultry, at the direction of Governor Pierce, arranged for shipment to New York city for exhibit purposes some hundred of flax straw, two bundles of retted flax straw and 10 pounds of linen fiber and 10 pounds of tow. The products from Oregon, together with those from other states and Canada, will be exhibited under the direction of the Dominion House, 124, with headquarters at Quilpu, Ont.

MORE MARKETS, GORE'S PLAN

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—Secretary Gore and Hoover presented their views on agriculture late Wednesday before the annual meeting of the national council of farmers' co-operative marketing associations, which also was assured by J. N. Kehoe, vice president of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Co-operative association, that members of his organization were not worried that reformers would put them out of business.

Secretary Gore, saying he had worked to install the idea of service into the agriculture department, declared, "we must continually expand our markets for our commodities." This, he added, "can best be accomplished by co-operative marketing. He was determined, he said, to set in motion every force to show that the American farmer is as wise in peace as he was in war."

Hoover gives views. Mr. Hoover outlined three principles to guide the agricultural movement, as he viewed it—to make the United States self-supporting in its food supply; to up-build organization among farmers and to eliminate waste. He also advanced further relaxation of the tariff of trade acts as applied to agriculture and urged establishment of better terminal facilities for distribution of farm products and independent audits for co-operatives to strengthen the recruiting of membership.

Mr. Kehoe, discussing in a discussion of credits, which formed the subject of an exhaustive debate by delegates, declared tobacco growers were not worried by the activities of anti-tobacco reformers because their product is not akin to alcohol and contains "the calories of soothing happiness." "No man ever held up a lamp post, went to jail or abused his wife and children because he smoked," Mr. Kehoe said.

GERMAN'S EYE TURNS SOUTH

CAPTOWN (AP)—Germans are scheming to win back their colonies in South Africa, and, according to Dr. Fogarty, Anglican bishop of Durbanland, South-West Africa will virtually be restored to them if certain political proposals are adopted. The Mail's correspondent quotes the bishop as saying: "If General Hertzog, the prime minister, accedes to the request of the Germans for entire self government, and we have a legislative body composed of elected members, you can safely say that every member of the house will be a German. In that event it is easy to imagine the strings being pulled in Berlin, the result would be equivalent to handing South-West Africa back to the German people."

The programs were ruined by continuous Morse or a piercing whistle which began every night just at the time when the American stations were due to begin broadcasting. The Morse contained no message and sounded as if someone were playing about with a key, and there was generally more Morse during this week than any time during the previous six months.
