Paavo Nurmi Plans Active Track Quest

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press) - Not content with reaching heights of fame and brilliance such as no other star in track history has ever reached, Paavo Nurmi, erstwhile jumper hanger of Helsinki, who raced to world's record glory Tuesday night in his American debut, has mapped out a campaign which will carry his flying feet through a good portion of the east and middle west during the next few months.

The phantom Finn will make his first appearance a week from Thursday night when he competes in a special race at the Municipal A. A. grounds on the Madison Square Garden track which he trod Tuesday night in conquering his foremost rivals, Joie Ray and Willie Ritola, and smashing three world's marks in two races.

Veterans who saw Nurmi Tuesday night for the first time were practically unanimous in proclaiming him the greatest of all distance runners, including such stars of bygone days as Alfred Sherub, the famous Englishman; Hannes Kohlemlainen, another Finn, whose star faded into oblivion in the last Olympics; and Sheppard, noted middle distance ace, and such famous names as John Paul Jones, Norman Taiter and Abel Kiviat.

(By the Associated Press) - Kente Rockne's "galloping hooves" trotted close to half the circumference of the earth in quest of football honors during the past season. They visited seven states in climates ranging from 10 above zero at Princeton, N. J., to 50 degrees above at Pasadena, Cal.

Paavo Nurmi's first performance in the United States in the mile race marked the third time he has run this distance in competition. The last time he ran the mile in open competition was in August, 1923, when he set the world's outdoor record at 4:19.2-6. Thus in two successive mile races he shattered the outdoor and indoor standards.

Griffith, commissioner of athletics in the western conference, Griffith looked over a few stars himself, having refereed a dozen games and talked with coaches from all sections of the country before arriving at this conclusion. He says Grauge's achievement in scoring four touchdowns against Michigan on long thrilling runs in less than 12 minutes after the start of the game was the outstanding individual performance of the season.

LEWIS LOSES TO BIG MUNN

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (By the Associated Press) - Wayne (Big) Munn, former University of Nebraska athlete, won the heavy-weight wrestling championship of the world here Thursday night by defeating Ed Strangler Lewis in two out of three falls.

Munn won the first and third and lost the second on a foul when he lifted Lewis from the floor and threw him out of the ring. Munn won the first fall in 21 minutes with a crutch and body hold and took the third fall in less than a minute with the same hold.

"Bill" Randow, who manages Lewis, announced before the third fall that his man was yielding under protest. After the match he declared it would be protested.

Pallaso was a contender in the recent world's featherweight championship elimination tournament in New York.

FOREST DAMAGE SMALL. PENDLETON, Ore. - Actual damage to timber on the Umatilla national forest during 1924 was only \$216, but it cost \$3224 to suppress the outbreaks, according to the annual report prepared by J. E. Lewis, forest supervisor. During the season there were 24 fires, 23 caused by lightning and an equal number by man. Within the limits of the forests the area burned over was 267 acres, and outside 1927 acres were burned.

To Organize "Five" Here Saturday Eve

What can a self-respecting city do when a town threatens to send a crack basketball team here on a private date and in return expects said city to retaliate with an invasion at another date set? Organize a basketball team and "hit the ball" of course.

And that's just what is going to happen in La Grande. The Purple Giants, of Stanfield, who for many years have terrorized other sporting centers with their excellent performance in the court, have invaded La Grande to play them in Stanfield January 21st and expect a game at La Grande February 11th.

A call for practice has been issued by several players who wore the colors of La Grande last year and in prior years, asking every basketball player in the city, not in high school, to appear at the high school gymnasium Saturday night, at 7:30 o'clock to pick off the rough edges, organize, and prepare to meet the Giants with a basal sling that will prostrate the Umatilla tossers in defeat.
