"Butterfly" Opens at Arcade This Afternoon.

Kathleen Norris' famous novel, "Butterfly," has been converted to the screen with remarkable fidelity in the Clarence Brown Universal Jewel production of the story, which had its local opening at the Arcade theatre today.

To those who enjoyed the novel the picture will undoubtedly be received with enthusiasm. Its action is clear cut and well defined and the direction smooth and carefully balanced. The cast was evidently chosen with extreme care in the matter of selecting the story characters.

Laura La Plante handles the title role with the finesse of a veteran "singer" and proving that comedy is a great field of training for dramatic acting. Ruth Clifford as her older sister carries the role of sisterly self-sacrifice with conviction and surety of pose, without doubt the greatest piece of acting she has ever registered in a film play.

Norman Kerry, as Kronold, the violinist, looks and acts like a violinist, a real feat for the gay and athletic Norman of other pictures. Although these three players carry the weight of the story, other members of the cast in roles of lesser importance contribute greatly to the value of the picture by their excellent performance. The remaining five major characters are portrayed by Kenneth Harlan, Cesare Gravina, Margaret Livingston, T. Roy Barnes and Freeman Wood.

The strength of the picture lies in its simplicity. It is more like a human document than a carefully arranged photoplay production, a real triumph of direction for Clarence Brown.

"The Garden of Weeds" At Star (One of Cruze's Best)

Cruze scores again! How many times we have heard this—for "Merton," "The Enemy Sex," "City That Never Sleeps"—and now "The Garden of Weeds," which opened at the Star theatre today. Betty Compson is the star of the production which is an adaptation by Walter Woods and Anthony Coldeway of the Broadway stage success by Leon Gordon and Doris Marquette. Warner Baxter, Rockcliffe Follows, Charles Ogle and Al St. John, head the strong supporting cast in featured roles.

The story is one of Dorothy, a very beautiful and refined young show girl, played by Miss Compson. She is fascinated by the forceful personality of Philip Flagg (Follows) who is backing the show in which she appears. She poses a vial to his paternal country home, "The Garden of Weeds," where he delights in entertaining the beau-

ties of the theatre. Here she discovers the man for whom she really is and leaves to marry Douglas Crawford (Baxter), an independently wealthy man of fine character.

Flagg leaves her in peace for a while, then suddenly appears, cleverly manages to get an invitation to dinner and tortures her by veiled conversation and broad references to her past which both think the husband does not understand. But the girl decides upon a bold course and, before the astonished Flagg can stop her, huris out the whole truth to Crawford. The men fight and, well, suffice it to say that Flagg's real "smash" climax is more than one sense of the word.

Among the big names in the cast supporting the principals are King Zany, William Austin, Lucille Thomsen, William Turner, Togo Fodora, and Lizon Robinson who has the same role on the screen as also portrayed in the legitimate play in New York City. Karl Brown, who "shot" "The Covered Wagon," did the photography.

A. C. Huntington has been appointed agent for receding subscriptions for stock in the La Grande Building and Loan association. Those desiring shares should leave their applications with him at once, as a new series No. 10, will be opened as soon as enough stock is subscribed to justify it.

O. O. Kincaid, secretary of the La Grande Building and Loan association, has been busy the past few days in settling up with the members on the third series which has been paid the stockholders, making over \$24,000 in cash paid out by this institution during the past year.

Rio Planning to Build Better Road for Autos

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Since an enterprising American concern started four years ago to sell automobiles to Rio de Janeiro chauffeurs on the installment plan, the city has become overcrowded with taxicabs. Of the 5000 machines in the city, nearly 6000 operate for hire, and the owner-chauffeurs have constantly to work overtime to meet their payments.

Relief, however, for the hard working drivers is expected from another direction. At the present time the roads are so bad it is impossible to drive more than four or five miles outside the city with any comfort; hence long distance roads are unknown. A new and good road is being built to Petropolis, a summer resort 20 miles away, and by the end of 1925 there doubtless will be a fine highway running from this city to Sao Paulo 250 miles to the west. These improved roads, it is believed, will make automobile riding so popular that thousands of new machines will have to be imported.

PROGRESSIVES IN OFFICE ALBANY, Ore.—Progressives of Albany took over the city management at the regular council meeting. The progressive element elected four councilmen and the mayor during the last election.

Mayor Rehnert outlined the policy of the new council in his speech and stressed economy, many improvements and a progressive program concerning inducements to be given industries. The building of an auditorium, gymnasium, industrial arts building and a new bridge over the Catawissa river were among some of the improvements noted in his address.

This new council will aid the Clear Lake water project and endeavor to enlarge the city in every way. Street and sewer extensions, city boundary extensions, closer cooperation with the rural communities and other progressive measures are on the programme of the new regime.
