ICE CROP IS HARVESTED
BAKERS, Ore.—The harvest for harvest at North Powder, where hundreds of tons of natural ice are stored by the Pacific Fruit Express company for use in refrigeration cars during the warm months, is well under way. Ice of superior quality is being obtained this season, due to the freezing of the lakes without interruption from wind or snow.

The ice being cut this year is about 15 inches in thickness and several cars probably will be shipped to the company's storehouse at Huntington and to consumers in neighboring towns when the houses at North Powder are filled.

Japan Colonizing Waste Land
TOKYO (AP)—The government is making a strong effort to colonize and develop waste lands of Hokkaido island for the purpose of giving government employees who will be let out by the first of the year under the reorganization plan. These men are to be given a substantial bonus upon discharge and the promoters of the idea believe it will be sufficient to enable them to make a good start on land allotments. About 249 families will be sent Hokkaido this year and 400 next year under government aid.
