Wartime German Stamps Fill Collector's Album

BERLIN (AP)—Every variety of postage stamp that was ever issued by German states or the German federal government was on view at a postage stamp show held here this month in commemoration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the issuance of German stamps and the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Universal Postal Union.

The fair was devoted exclusively to German philately. The vicissitudes of the World War found expression in the numerous surcharges of Belgian, French, Polish, Rumanian, Russian and other issues by German post offices in occupied areas, and the surcharges of British, French and Belgian post offices on stamps of the German colonies.

Tom Meighan Is Star in "Tongues of Flame."

Thomas Meighan comes to the Grande theater today next in a Paramount screen version of "Tongues of Flame," the last novel by the late Peter Clark MacFarlane—a Joseph Henabery production with Beadie Love, Eileen Perry and others playing in support of the star.

The picture shows how Roland, an unscrupulous business man, and Scanton, his tricky lawyer, steal a large tract of land from the Indians. Through Roland's efforts three towns spring up on the land and thirty years later Roland, rich and powerful, rules the towns and everyone in them.

At the close of the Great War, "Hot Fire" Harrington, the role played by Tom Meighan, opens a law office in one of the towns. He falls in love with Roland's daughter, Billie, and for a time works for Roland, but finally turns against him. Then a Billie-haired school teacher who is in love with Harrington, opens his eyes to the fact that Roland is making him up a fool to swindle the Indians for the second time.

In spite of the fact that Roland threatens to ruin and disgrace him, Harrington takes up the Indian fight. The remarkable over property rights makes the picture "Copy" and is divided in the Indian's favor. This turns the entire town against Roland—and what a scene there is! Growth surges through the streets being warehouses and shipping. It's a case of mob rule until Harrington arrives on the scene with a little band of loyal Indians who had moved in his company in the World War and brings the townspeople to their senses.

There's action-plot in "Tongues of Flame," drama, heart-appeal and all the rest. Meighan has never done anything quite like it before.

MONMOUTH. (Special)—The Oregon Normal school has resumed its work after the holidays. Nearly all the students spent the holidays at their various homes. Seven hundred pupils are registered for the winter term. Many new faces are seen among the student body. Classes are being organized and work will be in full swing within the next week.
