torial writers over the successful ending of the inter-allied influenza conference in Paris in that it has resulted in making the United States one of the guarantors of the Dawes reparations scheme.

"The result of the conference have no importance comparable with its broad effect, namely, the return of the United States to Europe," says the Westminster Gazette, which added:

"Whatever may be said of the United States, it is certain that the sense of justice is deeply implanted in her people and will impel them to stand firmly by their rights as against Germany. Moreover, the admission of America to the allied and associated powers means there will be no further incentive to Germany to default."

Ice Cream Cakes at the HOOD RIVER, Ore.—The epidemic of hemorrhagic fever which prevailed here recently, apparently a complication of some form of influenza, stimulated the consumption of ice cream. Victims of the affliction declared that eating ice cream furnished relief even after other remedies had failed. The city had a dozen hemorrhagic sufferers during the prevalence of the affliction.

Forestry Building Planned.

DENVER, Ore.—Work on a new forest service building in Shasta will start this week. It was announced from the headquarters of the Department National forest. The new structure, to be an office building, will replace the headquarters of the Shasta district, destroyed in the fire at Shasta last fall.

BAKER BONDS PREMIUM HIGH

BAKER, Ore.—Pierce-Pair and Company, Portland, were the successful bidders on the Baker county road bond issue of \$250,000. Their offer of a premium of \$17,745 on the amount being accepted by the county authorities yesterday evening. The bonds are to yield five per cent and will mature in 1944.

County officials yesterday expressed satisfaction with the result of the sale as the bonds commanded a premium of over two per cent.

be far more than offset by the enormous funds among the groups whose candidates had lost out.

By naming Stone out-of-hand such a situation was blocked before it started.

The naming of a successor to Stone, as attorney general, does not present a correspondingly difficult problem.

For whereas an associate judgeship on the Supreme Court is a high public office of direct interest to every citizen, a matter of the president's cabinet is a matter either personal with the president himself, and is not so subject to influence by outside pressure.

Coolidge's action in the Stone appointment was reminiscent of the propensity with which Roosevelt was wont to make his selections for high office.

Unless there were grave reasons for delay, or absolute doubt as to the fitness of the man he had in mind for a given post, T. R. always went in his nominations in short order.

And he frankly admitted his chief reason for so doing was to escape the aftermath of committee and wrecked hopes that follow a delayed appointment.

A mediocre appointment, promptly made, he held to be a better appointment, publicly, than a winning appointment made after the waters had been muddied by a political tug-of-war.

Senator Frank Brandegee, Edward "old-guard" senator, bachelor and recluse, who committed suicide in his home here in months ago, is revealed in having been the owner of a most curious collection of curiosities.

At an auction, where Brandegee's personal effects were sold, there were more than 100 paintings, some worth thousands, many worth little or nothing.

There were miniatures, jewel cases, antique jade and ivory carvings, inlaid with old bronzes.

And a fine etching by Anders Zorn—a beautiful woman, dressed in the style of 1909, about the year Brandegee entered the Senate!

COSTLY CARS AND BREAKS FEATURE BERLIN CAR SHOW

BERLIN (AP)—The German automobile exposition, which has just been held in Berlin, failed to show any car selling at a reasonable price, nor did it reveal any striking improvement in standard design of body or engine.

On the contrary, emphasis was laid on a car selling for \$10,000, and the only novelties were of the freak variety.

The lowest priced car sold for \$3,000 and the higher one for \$5,000 and \$10,000. There seems to be a good local market for the best of the industry this year, for the agent of the producing company said they were too busy with the home demand to think about export. They were building for sturdiness and durability, he declared.

The Germans are coming to see that they must standardize production to keep down costs. Until recently there has been almost no quantity production of parts, now certain firms arrange together to have certain parts made wholesale from mutually accepted specifications.

Among the freaks is a tapered car with one headlight and the motor in the rear, and a heavy car equipped with berth, kitchenette, shower bath and furniture.

The Germans have reached no satisfactory solution of the body question. The collapsible top is not popular because there is so much rain in Germany and the top, being the closed car is criticized on the ground of being too hot in summer, and the removable top is put down as clumsy.

Haiti Has Prospered Under American Wing

The American medical men for Haiti, Malaria is being checked and native doctors and nurses are being trained.

In 1915 public works had virtually ceased to function. Roads were wretched and without bridges and the lighthouses inadequate to the large number of harbors and the dangerous coast. Today there are more than 800 miles of good gravelled roads, many new bridges, 899 miles of new telephone and telegraph lines and a good telephone system in Port-au-Prince. The coast is now encircled by a chain of lighthouses and automatically lighted buoys which make navigation along the coast and into the harbors easy and safe.

In the summer of 1915 it is estimated that some 600 bandits infested Haiti. Life and property were not safe and travel on public highways had ceased. For the last four years Haiti has had peace and security. Peasants have returned to their homes or built new ones and the native or foreigner is perfectly safe in any part of Haiti.
