DEATH REMOVES MAN THAT KNEW 53 LANGUAGES

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Professor Carl J. Arnold, credited with being master of 53 languages, from the Eskimo to that of the African Hottentots and including all the leading languages of the world, died here recently.

He was secretary to American ambassadors to Japan for 12 years and was the second white man to complete the course in Oriental languages in the Imperial University of Tokio. It was said that he knew the Japanese and Chinese languages as few natives did. On leaving the American embassy at Tokio Mr. Arnold became a professor in two universities in the Japanese capital. When his health broke down four years ago, the Japanese government returned him to the United States on a battleship.

ECONOMY CAUSES SPELLING ERRORS IN THE CAPITAL

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy policy of the Coolidge regime has had its effects even in the drawing rooms of fashionable Washington society.

One of the latest items of expense to be clipped from the annual budget is the small but important number of monthly publications called the Diplomatic List, which in the times and official titles of all members of embassy and legation staffs heretofore have been made available by the state department.

Department officials have decided that now, to maintain the diplomatic book will be printed hereafter only when there has been an accumulation of necessary revisions. Consequently no business now can be certain without special inquiry of the precise rank of diplomatic officials or of the correct spelling of their names. The breaking news of this sort have to represent distant countries.

The change has been a particular cause of disturbance in special secretaries and society columns, accustomed for years to the possession of a ready-reference compilation of all Washington diplomats.

GORE PROMISE TO AID GIVEN

ALBERT BRUQUEE, N. M. (AP) Secretary Gore of the department

of agriculture, Thursday telegraphed the American National Livestock association in convention here, the department of agriculture will give earnest consideration and heed to every suggestion that promises to promote a better day for the American livestock man.

During the session the convention heard a vigorous criticism of the Butcher report on grading fees by H. A. Phillips of Baker, Ore., and a speech by W. W. Turney of El Paso, Texas, on problems confronting the industry. Turney stressed the fact that the stockman must stop over production of livestock.

The convention Thursday heard addresses by A. L. Williams of Washington, D. C., member of the federal land bank, H. A. Phillips of Baker, Ore., president of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon; W. W. Turney of El Paso, Texas, and Hubbard Russell of Los Angeles, president of the California Cattleman's association. Mr. Russell outlined the "California Plan for Marketing Livestock."

Grazing Fees Discussed.

Speaking on "Growing and Marketing Cattle in the Northwest," Mr. Phillips vigorously criticized the Butcher report on grading fees, recently presented to Secretary Gore of the department of agriculture. The report provides for heavy increases in these fees.

"Perhaps it will be interesting to our general public to know that according to the figures of the federal service officials more than 70 cents of every dollar paid into the forest service by the stock men as grazing fees is a net profit to our

government," said Mr. Phillips.

"In other words it costs the forest service less than 30 cents on the dollar to administer all branches of the forest in comparison with grazing. Is there any one who can inform me of any other branch of the government that is self-supporting? Can you imagine any one branch of the government demanding from an industry that is having a hard struggle for existence an increase in grading fees of over 70 per cent net profit now being made?"

"I appeal to you as a meat eating people to demand that this burden be not imposed."

There was no afternoon session of the convention. Instead delegates were taken to lunch to witness an Indian dance.
