Committee Will Help Congress' Air Policy

Laymakers to Receive Aid in Formulating Methods for Launching National Policy of Permanency.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Inspection of aviation centers throughout the United States will be carried out shortly by a congressional committee which hopes to formulate, before March 4, a report that will materially assist the Washington administration in evolving and putting into effect a permanent national air policy.

The inspection is planned as a part of efforts by congress to determine the needs of the country for an aircraft establishment. Representative Florian Lambert, Wisconsin, chairman of the select committee, says every member desires "a constructive and not a destructive investigation" in the hope that an outline of the country's aviation needs will be available before the adjournment of the Sixty-eighth congress.

Three phases of the aircraft problem will be presented in the final report: the present condition of the air service, the future air establishment and a study of patent and legal questions. The latter phase of the investigation was concluded before Christmas. The Lambert committee has gone into the problem of wartime production and is the authority for the statement that deliveries of aircraft and engines by the American aircraft industry during the 18 months the country was at war were greater than deliveries made by any of our associates during any 18-month period of the entire war.

Commenting upon the testimony given thus far before the committee, Representative Lambert said recently he was convinced that congress and the entire country needed a new perspective on aviation.

"Looking back over the record since 1917 it seems to me that all congress ever has done has been to appropriate money," the chairman declared. "What we need to do for aviation now is not necessarily to give it money in more liberal sums, but to more intelligently advise and direct as to how the money shall be spent."

Representative Lambert is convinced that aviation is first of all a commercial utility and not a military accessory but the "alarming weakness of our army and navy air services" convinces him that "it is only the part of wisdom to recognize the exigencies of the latter are unquestionably paramount today, and thus demand immediate, decisive and favorable action."

"I believe all the members of my committee recognize the fact that aviation must be developed along commercial lines, just as the American railway system was developed along commercial lines, rather than military," said Mr. Lambert, "but there is also sympathetic appreciation of the immediate national need that we dare not longer wait before providing some stimulant to the aerial arm. It will be costly and may be dangerous to delay."
