(Special).—Bert and Melvin Lawrence are on trial in circuit court here on charges of assault on Ralph Harvey with intent to kill, alleged to have been committed the night of October 15, near Ironsides, Ore. Mr. Harvey, complaining witness, contended that the two Lawrence brothers seized him the evening of October 14 and took him about a mile and a half west of the Ironsides store where the strung him up to a tree three times to make him confess that he had been acting as a "stool pigeon" for county authorities in reporting bootleggers.

ASSAULT TRIAL OPENED

VALE, Ore.—The trial of Bert and Melvin Lawrence, charged with assault with intent to kill, opened here. The brothers are accused of having removed Ralph Harvey from the ranch where he was working October 16, carrying him several miles and having placed a rope around his neck.

Funeral of Mr. McDonald will be held Friday but an announcement of the time and place will be made tomorrow. It was learned today at noon.

Peter Alexander McDonald, pioneer farmer and stockman of Union county, died yesterday afternoon at 2:25 o'clock at Hot Lake at the end of a strenuous fight on the part of physicians to save his life. Lobar pneumonia was the cause of his demise and it is reported he was ill some time before the pneumonia attacked him yesterday morning. His passing comes as a severe shock to his many friends and the community in general and it removes one more pioneer from the county roll, which is sadly diminished by the inroads of the Death Angel.

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Eagles Lodge Seeking Memorial Day Ruling

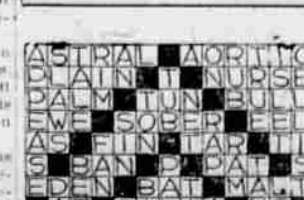
