COURTS GRANT 143 DIVORCES

PARIS (By Associated Press).—American divorces granted in the Paris courts during 1923 numbered 143 out of a total of 2,044. While the percentage of American divorces as regards the total number seems relatively small, it is much more important when one considers that all the divorces obtained by other foreigners of all nationalities during 1923 amounted to only 157.

No special legislation governs the granting of divorces to American citizens in France and none is in course of preparation.

After the McAdoo-Huger divorce in 1922, which caused some criticism, it being claimed that the existing laws had not been observed, the then Premier Poincare ordered an investigation to be made at the court house, into the facility with which divorces were granted to Americans in France.

The inquiry proved that both McAdoo and Huger had legal domiciles in France and that a duly registered certificate thereof had been filed.

The present legislation in France provides that in the applications for divorces emanating from American citizens, the laws of the various states in which they live in the United States shall apply.

TRADE RUDELY INVADES QUIET OF OLD OXFORD

OXFORD, E. C. (AP).—An entire block in the center of Oxford, comprising some 45 old buildings, is to be sold by the city within the next six months. Several hundred years ago the city bought this strip of waste land, lying outside the walls and along the horsemarket, for a mere song. Now the houses are at an end, and the freehold is extremely valuable. A portion already has been sold to a concern operating a garage company in under way.

As the block extends nearly the whole length of the Broad and back to Ship street, the university, and especially Balliol, Trinity, Exeter and Jesus colleges, are greatly concerned. The introduction of large stores and garages in this area would mar one of the finest streets left in Oxford, and add to the noise and traffic problem as well.

The university and the colleges concerned are too poor to buy the block, so an attempt is being made to have it purchased by wealthy subscribers for university purposes. In the meanwhile the city is going on with the sale. Now that the colleges have taken to purchasing their supplies from wholesalers outside Oxford there is no love lost between the university and city authorities.

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Sweden's Wealth Would Give People \$1,431 Each

STOCKHOLM (AP).—An average of \$1,431 for every man, woman and child, or a total of \$3,574,000,000, is the amount of Sweden's taxable wealth, according to an estimate by a leading financial expert, recently published here.

In the United States the per capita wealth is estimated at \$2,800. The total taxable income of the Swedish people during the year 1924 rose to \$1,132,400,000, and the total revenue of the Swedish government for the budget year 1925-26 is estimated at \$170,000,000, the last two items being disclosed in official estimates.

Sweden's national wealth is growing at the rate of 7.25 per cent a year. The taxable income of the Swedish people nets the government nearly \$29,000,000 this year, which happens to be equal to the amount of revenue which the state expects to collect during the next budget year on the manufacture and distribution of liquor. It is calculated that the tobacco monopoly will yield a revenue of \$12,400,000 and the automobile taxes \$1,020,000.

NAVY HAS NEED FOR 'SIX-FOOTER' EDISON CLAIMS

NEW YORK (AP).—Thomas A. Edison came out Tuesday with a few simple ideas for gun elevation on American battleships at little expense and also for getting work out of the navy's personnel.

Gun elevation could be obtained, he said, at little expense by adoption of the paravane principle. The paravane, he explained, was a sort of lateral rubber or tin strip which a battleship could be fitted to alter the range of the guns, much after the principle used by submarines in diving or coming to the surface.

The \$2,000,000 proposed in the naval appropriation for gun elevation he regards as needless.

A pound of mercury for each ship used with the apparatus, will do the trick," said the inventor. He added that his plan had been sent to Washington and rejected on the ground that it would cause too much retardation to the ship in motion.

"Do you know what the navy needs down in Washington?" he asked. "They ought to have a fellow about six feet tall and with a big jaw about eight inches across, from somewhere out in a backwoods country of Kansas."

Without such an amendment, said the resolution, boys and girls of several states would not have an opportunity to prepare for strong, virile citizenship. The proposed amendment was termed a "just, humane and wholesome measure."
