Tuneful Music of Last Century BERLIN (AP) — As if in sharp contrast to the ultra modern tendencies recently observable in the first nights at the Statoper, the Deutch's Opernhaus, another of Berlin's four operatic institutions has gone back to the fifties of the past century for a first-night, by producing Adolphe Adam's comic opera, "If I Were King." This return to the melodious, uncomplicated, charming airs of the age of Cherubini, Auber, Herold, Flo- low and Donizetti is the more significant as it also marks the gradual return of French opera to the German stage.

In its modern dress, with all the latest technical possibilities of the stage brought into play, Adam's opera was a decided success and numerous repetitions are planned.

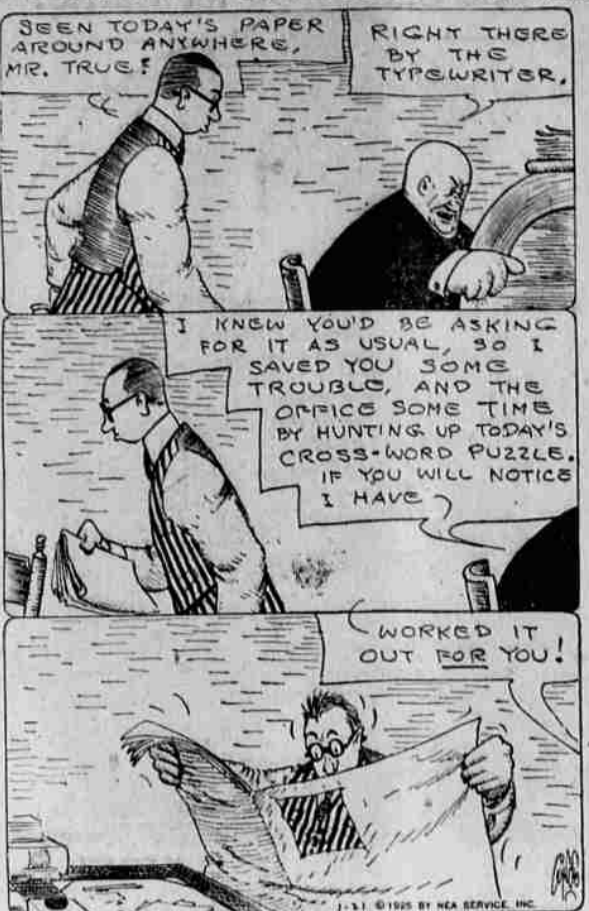
