The ground has now been covered 14 days; the weather at no time has been cold, and the thermometer has hovered a few degrees below the freezing point. Sleighting is now fine and six sleighs passed in view from our window while this article was being written, one of which was loaded with great blocks of ice.

J. H. Dobbins, of Wallowa, is registered at the Sommer House.

The local wheat market is not active. Quotations are hard to get as there are but few sales and the figures are not ranges from \$4.40 to \$4.50. The Chicago wheat market is stationary; Downing and Hopkins for Wednesday say the trade of wheat seems to be going into the July deal. Early yesterday the difference was 16 5/8 between July and May option; today it narrowed down to 3 3/4. January wheat at Chicago on Wednesday closed at 91 1/2 and July 82 1/2. Portland yesterday wheat was 72 cents.

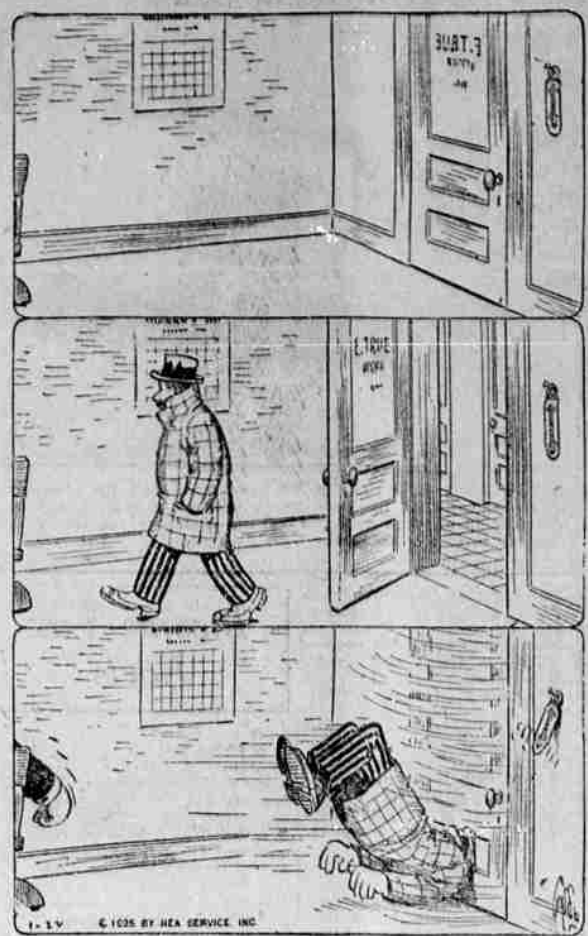
