ANOTHER AIMORY ASKED.
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Jan. 22.—A united effort is being made by the Cottage Grove Commercial club, the local unit of the national guard, and other persons in the city and in Lane county, to obtain at the present session the appropriation for the Cottage Grove armory, which was considered at the session of the legislature two years ago. Captain C. C. Cronson, commander of company B, 186th Infantry of the national guard, stationed in Cottage Grove, left for Salem to represent the city in the interest of the measure.

The city of Cottage Grove voted \$15,000 two years ago for construction of the building and the money is still available. The store is expected to match this \$15,000 from the city and the same amount from the county for the new building. When constructed it will be state property.

London's Underground Rivers May Be Both To Builders of Bank

LONDON (AP)—An almost forgotten stream, the River Walbrook, flowing through the City of London, is giving the builders of the new Bank of England something to think about. It is 50 feet or so below the surface, and as long ago as 1598, according to historians, it was vaulted over with houses above it.

In the days of William the Conqueror it was described as "a brook of sweet water," but has since developed into something of a sewer. Its course is through the Wall of London to Moorgate eastward then in the direction of the Mansion House, and it is believed that when the excavations are made for the new Bank of England, engineers will have some trouble.

Protection Experiment Aids Irish Industries

DEILIN (AP)—Protection for Irish home industries, introduced in the last budget by the Free State finance minister as a way experiment to see whether it worked and whether it warranted a permanent place in the government's policy, is said to have proved successful.

The Federation of Irish Industries has reported that the tax on shoes has stimulated the shoe trade and largely increased the output of the factories. The confectionery trade and the bottle making trade are said to have been similarly helped.

In the tobacco trade the duty imposed for revenue purposes has operated as a tariff and has resulted in the establishment in the Free State of English firms anxious to retain their Irish trade by coming within the tax barrier. They have spent \$1,500,000 on buildings, and the factories have given employment to 1000 hands.
