American Doctor Plan To Visit England Next June LONDON, (AP)—The Interstate Post Graduate Assembly of America, an organization comprising about 75,000 members of the American medical profession, will hold its annual congress in England next June.

The party of some 200 or 400 representatives of the assembly which will visit England, will be headed by Dr. Charles Mayo, of Rochester, Minn., and will be welcomed here by a large Anglo-American committee including such distinguished persons as Sir Humphrey Rolleston, Sir William Arbuthnot Lane, Sir William White, and Sir St. Clair Thompson.

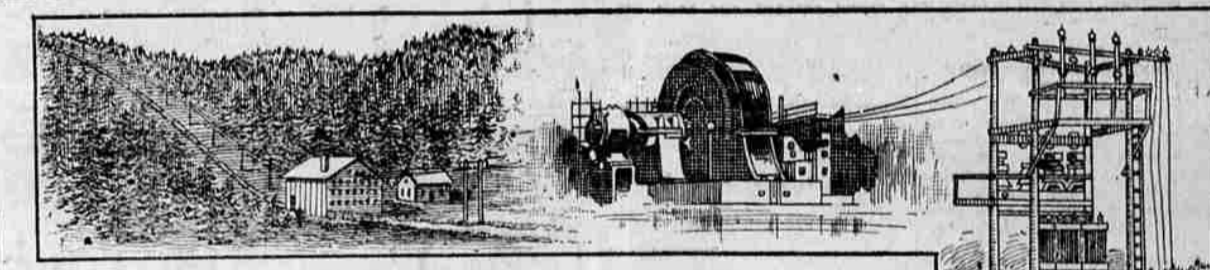

Speaking Of Taxes

Taxes of all kinds have come in for pretty thorough consideration this year. We are beginning to realize more clearly how much taxation has added to the cost of living and doing business. Yet it is surprising how few people know that Eastern Oregon electric power, too, is taxed at the source of production.
