Among the candidates for jobs this year are solicitors and stock brokers' clerks, medical students, electrical engineers, schoolmasters, farmers' sons, professional golfers, soldiers and sailors. Successful candidates get three pounds weekly during nine weeks' instruction duties and ten shillings more when passed as efficient.
