GERMAN WORK TO BE A PROTECTION FROM THE SEINE

PARIS (AP).—To Germany may revert the task of protecting Paris from the inundations of the Seine recurring every few years, plans for the curbing of which have been under study since the days of Henry IV.

Victor Petral, minister of public works, replying to a suggestion from M. Emile Brisson, president of the general council of the Seine department, that "Germany cooperate in the execution of great works of public utility," replied as follows:

"I have the honor to inform you that following the London agreement the question of the cooperation of public works has been reopened and the conditions under which Germany could make certain deliveries in kind, the amount of which would be placed to the credit of its reparations account, are being examined anew.

"It is not possible for me at present to tell you to what extent the work of protecting Paris and its suburbs against the inundations of the Seine would benefit by these deliveries, but you may be assured that the matter will be studied thoroughly and that my administration is resolved to do everything possible to hasten the solution of the problem."

M. Brisson's plan provided for deliveries from Germany of steel and iron girders and other articles destined to form the structure of reinforced concrete walls, to be built along the river banks from Chantilly, ten miles east of Paris, to Argenteuil, about the same distance west.

Veronia to Pave Streets. VERONIA, Ore.—At regular meeting of city council, T. H. Boyd was put in charge of finance and general city improvements. The movement of Berlin street, recently taken over from Columbia county, was discussed and it was decided to pave the thoroughfare as weather permitted, also to hard-surface First, Second and Third street. Blythe, Witter and company purchased city sewer bonds amounting to \$17,266 at par. These bonds bear 6 per cent interest.

Both appointments were announced by Governor Pierce.

Berlin Adopts American Methods of Housing. BERLIN, (AP)—Frame houses modeled upon American patterns are beginning to be popular in Berlin. A whole section of wooden houses, a slight hitherto unknown in large German cities, is springing up on the extreme west end of the German metropolis. The Germans have heretofore clung to the idea of wooden houses. Anything that did not last through several generations did not seem worth building to them. But today economic necessity has driven them to study the problem of the wooden house. To their surprise they find that wood has stood the test of time in America, where there are houses dating back to Colonial days. They are, therefore, trying out the wooden house idea, which they find much cheaper than stone and brick construction. Another housing idea that the Germans are taking from the United States is the two, three and four room apartment. These are designed along American lines and are popular in Berlin.
