NEW MODEL OF CHEVROLET IN

WRECKERS BARE SECRETS OF OLD LONDON STREETS

LONDON (AP)—So many buildings are being torn down in London nowadays to make way for modern and comparatively large modern structures, that various sections of the old city are being taken on the bustling appearance of a new and rapidly growing American town. Also the demolitions often give passers-by unexpected glimpses of ancient houses hidden from view.

It was here that Henry Hudson and his companions came before they sailed from the Thames on their last voyage to the frozen north.

STUDENTS ARE HONORED

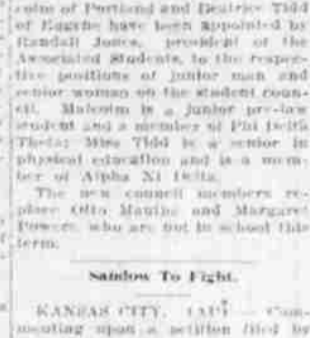

Patriotic Women Purchase the Betty Washington Home

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. (AP)—America's newest national shrine, the Kenmore, the mansion that was the home of Betty Washington, is to be dedicated May 1, and President Coolidge has been asked to attend the ceremony.

In the drawing room of the historic home a simple ceremony, on Jan. 1, marked the transfer of the last \$5,000 of the purchase price of \$50,000 to the former owners, and the property passed into the possession of the Kenmore Association, a national organization with headquarters here.

Three years ago the property was about to be cut up into building lots and sold when a group of women, representing the Washington Lewis Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, conceived the idea of purchasing the estate and preserving it for posterity. Accordingly the Kenmore Association was organized and an active campaign was carried on every state in the Union.

Kenmore was built in 1752 by Colonel Phillip Lewis in the home of his bride, and it was there that he and Betty Washington lived for many years. At that time the mansion house of an acre-acre farm. It now occupies a quiet and dignified spot in the residential section here.
