Light for Entire Island SEATTLE (AP).—Christmas light was furnished residents of Vashon Island, in Puget Sound by the ocean-going tug Roosevelt which carried Robert E. Perry north to a point whence he sledged to reach the North Pole, April 6, 1909. A power cable to the island had been wrecked in a storm. Two hundred horse power was generated by the Roosevelt's steam engine which enabled more than 1,000 Vashon citizens to have a bright Christmas after the island had been in darkness five days.

Aviators Bar Stunt Flying While Carrying Passengers

LOS ANGELES (AP).—More than thirty civilian aviators of Southern California have organized and issued a safety code governing flying while carrying passengers.

Each aviator assenting to the code pledged himself not to engage in stunt flying with any passengers. He also agreed to certain restrictions as to ordinary flying and to the condition of his plane.

The acceptance of the code does not affect stunt flying by aviators while in the air alone or in motion picture or other commercial work calling for it, but refers only to safety of passengers and to consideration of persons on the ground.

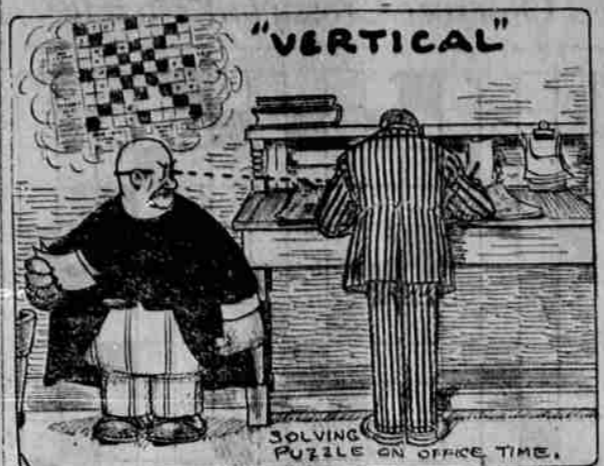

Czechs Favor Continued Beer, Price Regulation by Government

PRAGUE (AP).—A row over the price of beer is the chief topic of public interest in the Czech capital these days. The brewer and the saloon and restaurant keepers want to see the decree of the ministry of food rescinded, by which a maximum price is set upon the beverage and the calculation of costs is made by the government. The liquor interests want to do their own calculating, and to charge whatever the traffic will bear.

In sharp opposition to them are the consumer's organizations, which have urged the retention of government regulation. The recent public hearing held by the ministry of food broke up in a row, both sides beginning an embittered fight that would report the arguments of both sides to the minister of food.

Hawaiian Income Taxes Large.

HONOLULU (AP).—The territory of Hawaii paid into the United States treasury during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1924, individual income taxes of \$5,921,422 and miscellaneous taxes of \$775,355, making a grand total of \$6,696,777, according to official figures released by the collector of internal revenue.

The total individual income tax payment exceeded the payments of each of 12 states in the union, announcement said.

New Army Plane Carries Eight Patients and Surgeon

SAN FRANCISCO (AP).—The army is extending its air ambulance service and has designed a plane that will carry at least eight patients, a surgeon and a pilot, it was announced recently at Wiley Field here.

The army has in commission at present an aerial ambulance that will hold two patients and a surgeon in addition to the pilot. The plane is so constructed that it is easy to load and unload patients. The surgeons sits in the center between the patients, and by the use of levers can move them backward or forward. Thus he is enabled to reach any part of a patient's body to adjust bandages or administer medicine.

The local hospital plane is called the rescue ship and is available for service at a moment's notice.
