Paavo Nurmi Again Sets New Record

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York (By the Associated Press)—Paavo Nurmi scored one of the most spectacular victories of his American invasion Tuesday night when he won the three-quarter mile race featuring the opening night of the Milwaukee games, conquering Joe Hay and three other rivals.
The phantom Finn only beat Ray by 10 yards in a brilliant finish after trailing the latter's pace for seven laps of the eight-lap journey but shattered the world's record for the distance, which he covered in 3:03.4-5.
Nurmi faced probably the greatest test of his American campaign by meeting a quartet of stars over the shortest distance he has run here, but the Aho Antelope with an amazing burst of speed, removed any lingering doubt of his ability to conquer this country's best over any route.

BALL SCANDAL QUIZ GOES ON

NEW YORK (AP)—The district attorney's investigation into the Dolan-O'Connell bribery scandal was continued Tuesday when Horace Ford, second baseman of the Philadelphia Nationals, was questioned as to his knowledge of the \$500 bribe offered to Helme D. Sano, Philadelphia shortstop, by Jimmy O'Connell, New York outfielder, in a game here near the close of last season.
Ford, it was understood, told Assistant District Attorney Brothman in charge of the probe, that his first knowledge of the affair came when Sano took him into his confidence after the game. According to the testimony taken before Commissioner Landis, Ford advised Sano to "use his own judgment." Subsequently Sano related his story to Arthur Fletcher, manager of the Phillies.
The examination of Ford following interrogation Monday of other figures in the scandal, Frank Frisch, captain of the Giants, and Sano.

DEMSEY TRAINER IS UNDER ARREST

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Teddy Hayes, trainer of Jack Dempsey, was arrested by federal authorities here late Tuesday on a New York warrant charging him with being a fugitive from justice in connection with an alleged conspiracy to transport films of the Dempsey-Carpenter fight of July 4, 1921.
Arraigned before United States Commissioner Raymond L. Turney, Hayes made bond of \$2500 and his removal hearing was set for February 4.

The trainer, in a statement to newspaper men, protested his innocence and expressed confidence that he would clear himself of the charge.

Hayes, together with a number of other men prominent in American sporting circles, was indicted by a New York federal grand jury as a member of an alleged conspiracy which resulted in the transportation of the fight films from West Orange, N. J. to New York by William H. White, the day following the championship bout.
The list of indicted was headed by the promoter George J. ("Tex") Rickard, and included Hayes, Frank R. Flournoy, matchmaker for Rickard, Fred O'Quinn, William Rudolph, Jasper Muma, James Laughter and G. McLeon Baynes.

Furthermore there is not much opportunity to pull a deal which would whet the fielding and hitting average of the team, although a trade of some sort may be closed before the opening of the spring training season.
