SALEM, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—No income tax legislation would be considered by the senate of house under a house concurrent resolution introduced by Calkins of Jackson county. The resolution points out that it has

been the policy of the house not to concern itself with legislation which the people have turned down at the polls.

A bill sponsored by the Anti-Saloon League introduced in the house would make fines compulsory in liquor law cases with a minimum of \$500 and a maximum of \$2000. The minimum jail sentence for first time violators would be raised from 30 days to six months.

A house bill introduced by Lewis of Multnomah county, provides that church exemptions from taxation be cut to \$5000 property value and to one-half an acre of land.
