Negri Picture Laid In China Coming To the Arcade.

"Gone Native" is a term of reproach throughout every continent in the world which carries the greatest bitterness of which the white race is capable. To "go native" means that a white man has forgotten the traditions of his race and begins to associate with the native people of the land where he is living.

In America, the native peoples have been so far absorbed that it is almost impossible for a white man to win this term of reproach but in many oriental and African countries where the white race considers itself above the native populations, the term is still one of contempt.

Examples of what happens when a man "goes native" are shown very powerfully in Pola Negri's latest starring picture for Paramount, "East of Suez," an adaptation by Suda Cowan of Somerset Maugham's stage play. Pola plays the role of a girl who is supposed to be of mixed parentage—a white girl, educated in England, but living in Shanghai where her father, before his death, was British consular agent.

Social inequality with others of the English colony causes many painful moments for the beautiful girl who finds herself, though independently rich, alone and friendless in China, the prey of both native and foreign rascals who seek to take advantage of her solitary position.

"East of Suez" comes to the Arcade theater for a run of three days, Thursday. Featured in support of Pola are Edmund Lowe, Rockcliffe Fellows and Noah Berry. Others, prominent on both stage and screen, appear in the cast.

Imposing Cast Features New Fox Photoplay at Star.

DRY ADVOCATES IN GERMANY SHOW MUCH ACTIVITY

BERLIN (AP) — The prohibition issue is gradually becoming a live one in Germany. During the campaign for parliament recently closed the anti-liquor interests for the first time tried definitely to compel parties and candidates to declare where they stood. Most persons queried were able, however, to sidestep the issue without losing any votes.

Among the demands put forward by the German prohibition forces are the following: An embargo upon all intoxicating drinks imported from other countries; immediate closing of all saloons of a shady character; restriction of liquor production to the quantity essential for medicinal and religious purposes; sequestration of all breweries and distilleries; socialization of restaurants and hotels; strict prohibition of the sale of intoxicating drinks to boys and girls under age.

Most German people favor the last named of these demands, but on the whole are skeptical as to the practicality of prohibition. The stories they read about rum runners and booze fighters in the United States are cited as evidence that prohibition cannot be enforced.

Smiles for Tourists; Frowns for Refugees

PARIS (AP) — The French government has no desire to hinder or check the arrival of foreign tourists. Camille Chautemps, minister of the interior, has explained in a letter to the president of the New Chamber of Commerce, who had expressed fear that certain regulations in course of preparation would affect the tourist trade unfavorably. Vexatious formalities for visiting foreigners will be avoided by a temporary document, he says, obtainable from hotel keepers, which will take the place of the identity card.

M. Chautemps feels, however, that owing to the fact that the foreign population of France has recently been composed of refugees from various European countries, a closer check should be kept on

immigration. Some of these refugees have willingly accepted the burdens which accompany residence in France in the matter of formalities and taxation. Others, on the contrary, have shown no desire to comply with the regulations; they do not register their addresses, obtain identity cards or pay taxes.

Failure to produce receipts for income and other taxes will be followed by a refusal of the authorities to issue or renew the foreigners' identity card.

Loan Increases Sweden's Debt. STOCKHOLM (AP) — Sweden's national debt increased during the month of November by 11,500,000 crowns to 1,727,600,000 crowns, because of the dollar loan floated in the United States. The property of the Swedish government is estimated at 2,395,000,000 crowns, while securities amount to 550,000,000 crowns.
