TIGERS READY FOR INVASION OF PENDLETON

The La Grande basketball team will have a fairly busy week end. Tomorrow afternoon the squad will journey to Pendleton there to meet the dauntless Buckaroos on their own floor and on their return here Saturday will meet the Union quintet in the high school gym.

Hopes for a victory Friday are not high for Pendleton has several of last year's men of known ability on the team led by the redoubtable Hatton who was Buckaroo high point man at the eastern Oregon tournament last year.

Strong Team.
Hatton, Sager, Dale and Hartung, 1924 lettermen are in uniform and reputed better than ever and with several new men out the Pendleton quintet must be considered a strong team. So far Pendleton has had about a 50-50 break with opponents but has played such teams as Walla Walla, Lewiston and other formidable outfits.

MacTavish's team is gradually hitting its stride and is playing better ball now than ever before. The new men are very short on confidence yet and still lack the ability to keep pace mentally with the different breaks in the game.

A good deal of time this week has been spent in practicing basketball shooting following the team's notably poor showing in this department of the game on the trip up the branch line last week.

Ten Men to Play
MacTavish will take ten men to Pendleton. The lineup for the start of the game according to present plans will be Glass and Lyman, forwards, Unamuno, center, and Hummel and Zundel guards with Larson as first reserve.

Union Here Saturday
Preceding the boys' game with Union, Saturday evening the girls' sextettes of the two schools will play. This will be the first game between the two this year.

PHILADELPHIA (By the Associated Press) Connie Mack's Athletics, the mystery team of 1924, are looked upon as the most strengthened rival of the Washington Senators and New York Yankees in the quest for the 1925 American league flag.

The sensation of the league early in 1923, only to flop back at mid-season, the Athletics played better ball after July 4 last season in games won than any other team in the league.

Connie Mack has few predilections to make. He is standing pat on the team that finished the 1924 campaign in such excellent style but is hopeful that added strength to his battery department will put his club in the race.

Robert "Lefty" Groves, southpaw acquired from Baltimore for a reported \$100,000, is the mainstay of Mack's pitching hopes. For the rest of his mound staff, Mack has six veterans headed by Eddie Rommel, famous knuckle ball ace. The others are Bryan Harris and Sam Gray, right handers, and Meeker, Baumgartner and Heilmann, southpaws.

Although the name of Eddie Farrell, Pennsylvania baseball captain, appears in the reserve list of the New York Giants, Manager John McGraw said Tuesday that Farrell has not signed a big league contract. Farrell is said to be one of the cleverest infielders seen in college baseball circles since the days of Eddie Collins. Farrell has promised McGraw he will co-operate with the Giants if he elects to follow baseball as a profession.

Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul thinks he has outgrown the light heavyweight class and is at his best as a heavyweight. Great difficulty was encountered he said, making the 175-pound weight. His best fighting weight is between 180 and 185, he said. He is willing, he said, to train down to meet Mike McTigue, world's light heavyweight champion.

Nurmi's visit to the United States has caused a tremendous revival in track interest, but one of the leading authorities asserts his coming will react against the game in this country in that the records will be lowered to such an extent that breaking one will be beyond the power of American endurance and consequently cause a lapse in interest.

Finn Runner At It Again Marks Fall

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York (By the Associated Press)—The phantom feet of Paavo Nurmi clicked off two more world records Wednesday night in another amazing flash of speed that left all opposition far behind.

Bringing his total of world record performances up to 15 in nine races Nurmi set marks for one and one-quarter and two and one-half miles in a race in which Jole Ray dropped out after four laps, but the crowd of 12,000 got its greatest thrill when Plant, stepping the greatest race of his career, decisively conquered the picturesque Frigerio and established a world's indoor record for 5000 meters.

Bringing the two-night Millrose amateur athletic track and field carnival to a spectacular climax, Plant walked away from his famous European rival to win by 110 yards in a race which lost its third entrant unexpectedly when George Golding, Canadian veteran and Olympic champion of 1912, was forced to withdraw because of physical breakdown.

MACK'S TEAM IS PROMISING

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When Harold Osborn, Illinois A. C. leaper, scaled that dizzy height of six feet, 6 1/2 inches in an exhibition jump Tuesday night, he just tickled the cross bar enough to cause a slight vibration which threatened to send the stick from its lofty perch and set a world's indoor high jumping record. When it stopped quivering Osborn gave one leap of joy and shook hands all around with everyone within gripping distance.

ANOTHER WIN CHALKED UP BY HORSEMEN

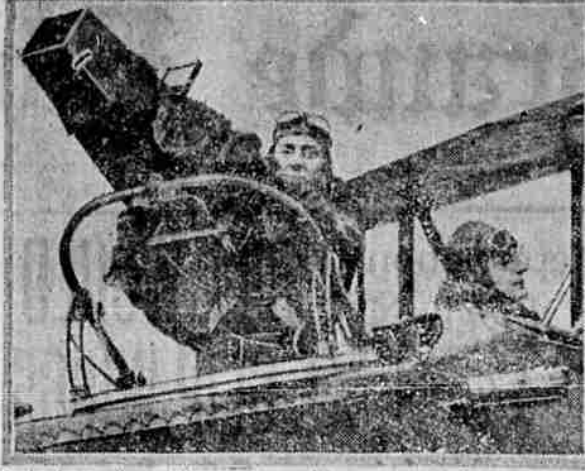

EARTHQUAKES RECORDED
WASHINGTON (AP)—Two pronounced earthquakes were recorded on the seismograph at Georgetown university here Tuesday night and early Wednesday. The first quake began at 11:29 p. m., lasting until about 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, with the maximum tremors about 12:10 a. m. The distance of this quake was estimated at about 500 miles from Washington. The second quake reached a maximum from 6:16 to 6:29 a. m., ending at 6:45 a. m. The distance of the second quake was not ascertained.
